

Club Votes No On Lease Lend

Members of Mt. Angel Group to Write Protest to Congressmen

MT. ANGEL—The Mt. Angel Civic club, meeting at the home of Hubert Kaser Tuesday night, pledged itself to an "America first" policy and members agreed to write congressmen asking them to pursue such a course in the present crisis and vote against the "lease and lend bill," and to keep the United States out of the European war.

Inflation, previously discussed by the club, was again brought up for discussion. Cited as a sign that the inflation danger was real was the fact that a group of 30 men representing the federal reserve system drew up a program to fight off and prevent, if possible, inflation. Another sign mentioned was that money men are buying up all the real estate they can lay their hands on.

Twenty-one potential members of a parish credit union were signed up. Some of the aspects of the credit union were explained for the benefit of new members and a definite course regarding the establishing of a credit union here agreed upon.
