Junior Chamber Plans Made

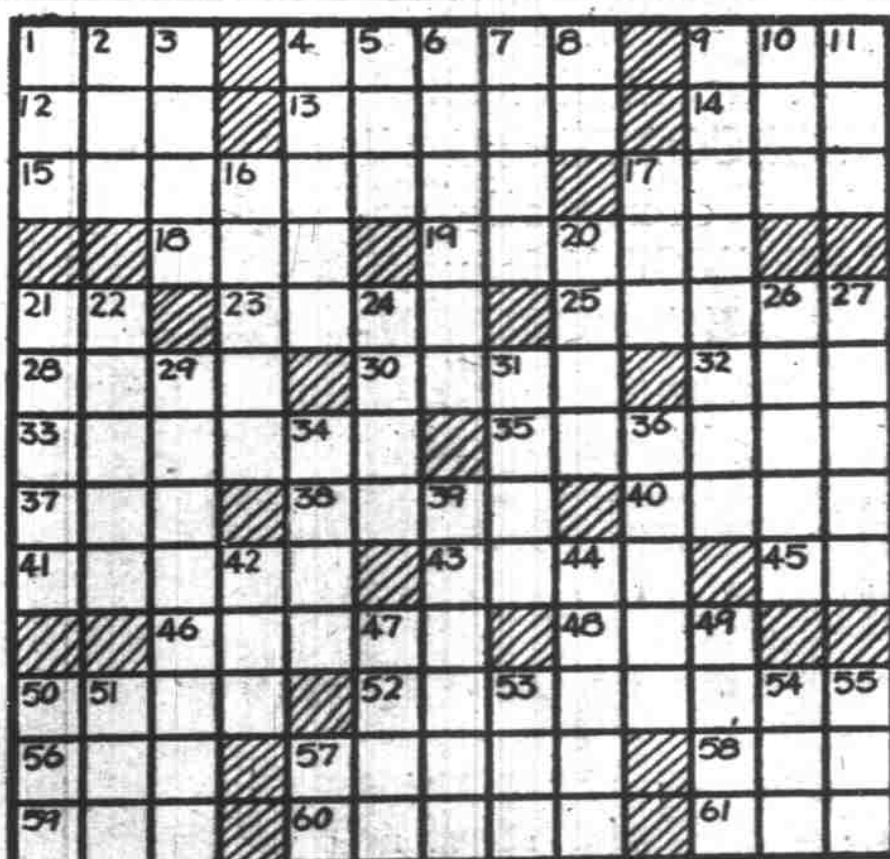

Malted Flavor Is In Cookies

Chocolate malted milk powder is good for something besides just chocolate malts, although they are good enough to satisfy most families' desire for malt flavor. This recipe for malted milk cookies will make an excellent between-meal snack.

CHOCOLATE MALTED CRUNCHIES

(Makes 3 dozen)
1/4 cup butter
1/4 cup light brown sugar (firmly packed)
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/4 cup cake flour
1/4 cup chocolate malted milk powder
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1 egg white
1/4 cup nut meats (finely ground)

Cream butter. Add sugar slowly, beating constantly. Add well-beaten egg and vanilla extract. Sift cake flour once before measuring, then add chocolate malted milk powder, baking powder, salt and cinnamon and sift together. Add to creamed mixture. It will be very stiff and the last of the dry ingredients must be worked in gradually with the finger tips. Form into a roll, wrap in waxed paper and chill in refrigerator for several hours or longer. When ready to bake, unwrap, cut in 1/4 inch slices and arrange on a lightly floured cookie sheet. Brush lightly with egg white (beaten slightly with a fork) and sprinkle with finely ground nut meats. Preheat the oven of the electric range and bake at 275 degrees for approximately 5 minutes.

SALLY LUNN WITH BRAZIL NUTS
Cream together 1/4 cup shortening and 1/4 cup sugar until light and fluffy. Stir in 1 egg, well-beaten. Mix and sift together 2 cups flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder and 1/4 teaspoon salt; add alternately with 1 cup milk. Stir in 1/2 cup chopped Brazil nuts, or filberts. Pour batter into a greased 8-inch square pan. Mix 1/4 cup chopped Brazil nuts with 2 tablespoons sugar and teaspoon cinnamon; sprinkle mixture over batter. Dot with 1 tablespoon butter; bake 40-45 minutes in a moderate oven (350 degrees). Cut in squares and serve hot.
