

Probate Court Change Sought

Legislation Is Proposed to
Have Circuit Judges
Handle Matters

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Meanwhile the senate industries committee had in prospect for introduction Monday a bill to make the experience rating section of the unemployment compensation law comply with a 1939 amendment to the federal social security act. It would require an employer's account to have been subject to benefit payments for three years instead of one year, before experience rating credits would be approved. This bill's introduction was requested by the commission, which requested that it be enacted without delay so that experience rating might be put into effect July 1.

Charge backs and other preliminary work are now under way as affecting future rates for about 6000 eligible employers.

Aside from introduction of a considerable number of bills the only activity to enliven Thursday's session was final unanimous approval in the house of the joint memorial congratulating President Franklin D. Roosevelt on his inauguration next week, pledging the Oregon legislature's support of the defense program and urging the president and congress to keep the nation secure and at peace.

Argumentative oratory was heard in the house for the first time this session when the memorial came up, but no one objected to its passage. Representative Warren Erwin (D-Multnomah), quoting Stephen Decatur's famous remark about "Our Country, right or wrong," complained about the deletion of a reference to the third term and Representative A. Hugh Adams (D-Multnomah) added commendation of the president.

Memorial Considered

Admonition to President Representative James A. Rodman (R-Lane) listed a number of things, such as balancing the budget, for which he would not congratulate the president, and said he considered the memorial in its final form an admonition to the president and congress, rather than a congratulatory message.

Representative Carson closed debate with an appeal for unity and support of "whoever is in command" in nation, state and the legislature, in a time of crisis. Speaker Robert S. Farrell, Jr., halted final passage of a resolution introduced by Representative Richard L. Neuberger (D-Multnomah) praying for "complete recovery" of United States Senator Charles L. McNary, by referring it to a committee.

Earlier in the day Speaker Farrell announced he would refer Neuberger's legislative reapportionment bill to a special reapportionment committee, rather than to the regular committee on elections, but would appoint as chairman of the special committee Representative John Steinhilber of Marion county who heads the elections group.

Meanwhile Representative E. W. Kimberling (R-Grant) had ready a bill which would give each county at least one representative, doing away with joint districts, and leaving Multnomah county with its present representation.

Kimberling, who represents Grant and Harney counties said: "I have 14,000 square miles to represent. In Portland one fellow could more easily represent 50,000 people."

Three labor department bills which cost insurance companies \$150 yearly as inspection fees on all elevators and boilers insured were headed for controversy in the house, discussion indicated.

Educator Claims Intolerance Bad For Democracies

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16-(AP)—Palmer Bevis of New York, executive director of citizenship educational service, tonight declared that intolerance is a menace to democracy.

"We must not become so terror-stricken that in the name of democracy we play democracy," he told the annual meeting of the directors of the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

The general federation is affiliated with the Citizenship Edu-

national service, which Bevis said is working through 24 national organizations, having a combined membership of 30,000,000 Americans, "to strengthen and buttress our American democracy so that the seeds of foreign propaganda will fall upon sterile soil."

Old Age Pension Asked in Montana

HELENA, Mont., Jan. 16-(AP)—A \$40 old age pension bill was

introduced in the Montana house of representatives today. Rep. Holding (Missoula), author of the measure, also sponsoring two bills to provide for financing the monthly grants by diverting a large part of the state

liquor monopoly profits to the old age pension account. Present pensions, averaging slightly more than \$19 a month, are paid cooperatively by the state, the federal government and the counties.
