Tax Totals Given—A total of \$1,846,795.39 was collected in taxes in Marion county in 1940, report of Sheriff A. C. Burk filed with the county clerk revealed yesterday. Of the total amount, \$28,922.74 was on hand on January 1 of that year. Other collections were \$1,510,102.39 from the current roll, \$309,085.03 from the delinquent list, and \$685.23 from yield taxes. The sum of \$1,772,614.77 was turned over to the county treasurer, and \$74,180.62 was on hand last December 30. A turnover of taxes collected in the current year from the 1936 roll filed today with the county clerk showed \$2886.22, of which \$361.58 is apportioned to the Salem school district and \$490.62 to the city of Salem.

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Bartges Given Long Sentence

Five Year Term Covers All Crimes Committed; Kidnaping Dropped

When Warren E. Bartges, Jr., emerges from the Oregon state prison after serving a five-year term imposed on him Saturday for theft of the A. R. Hunter car last January, he will have absolved himself before the law for all offenses charged against him in Marion county.

This was revealed following his appearance before Judge L. H. McMahon for sentence on six separate charges to which he pleaded guilty.

On recommendation of District Attorney Miller B. Hayden, the sentences were arranged so that completion of the five year term would clear the defendant of the other charges against him.

In consequence he was given a one-year sentence in the state prison for larceny by bail of a truck belonging to Martin Flamm on September 1, 1938, the term to run concurrently with that for the Hunter automobile theft.

He was given six months in jail and paroled to Sheriff A. C. Burk on January 1, 1939, on charges. These included passing NSF checks on Mrs. Robert B. Hamilton, passing of further check on Don Madison on December 3, 1939, and of breaking jail in Marion county December 30, 1939. He had originally pleaded guilty to the Hamilton check charge on January 10, 1939.

Kidnaping Charges Dropped for Evidence Lack
Charges of kidnaping Mrs. Hunter, owner of the stolen car, were dropped against Bartges in justice court on grounds of insufficient evidence.

The district attorney indicated that Mrs. Hunter is deceased since the alleged kidnaping occurred, and that she left no valid evidence of the kidnaping.

Bartges was wanted in Spokane and South Bend, Wash., and in Dallas, Tex., to answer other charges in addition to those against him in Marion county.

In addition to passing sentence against Bartges, Judge McMahon sentenced Edward Mills to serve 30 days in the Marion county jail on a charge of passing a bad check on Cleve W. Bartlett, but later paroled him on condition that restitution be made within 60 days on the Bartlett check and two others. The defendant described himself as a transient tailor.

Bridge Building Parley Planned

Marion and Polk County Courts Discuss Plan to Span Willamette

Tentative plans were put forth Saturday for joint meetings Monday of the Marion and Polk county courts relative to the possible construction of an "inter-county bridge across the Willamette river as a link in the proposed Salem-Independence-Kings Valley highway. No final arrangements for such a meeting were announced.

Following discussion of the matter by the two courts, further conferences will be held with State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock in order to ascertain the state's interest in such a development. It was revealed.

The matter was brought to the attention of the Marion county court here Saturday by E. A. Mills, speaking for the high association which is sponsoring the Salem-Kings Valley development.

According to Miller, Senator Dean Walker of Independence has obtained tentative assurances from members of the state highway commission that the state body might consent to the erection of such a bridge with state funds.

In return, the two counties would be expected to reimburse the state with moneys now spent on ferries at Independence until an appreciable portion of the cost were defrayed by the two counties immediately concerned. About \$4000 yearly is now spent on the Independence ferry.

Relative to this aspect of the proposal, Judge Leroy Hewlett remarked Saturday that Marion county would find the reconstruction of the South River road an expensive investment, which might preclude extensive bridge building activities on the part of the county. The judge, however, indicated that conferences on the matter might profitably be held with all interested parties.

First Aid Class Slated Wednesday

Following the successful completion of two standard first aid classes at the Salem high school, a third standard class will begin Wednesday at 1:30 p. m. on the third floor of the old high school building, room 3M, under Maynard Clark, instructor.

The two classes which have completed the course of instruction include 25 persons of Salem who are interested in equipping themselves to give efficient first aid assistance in time of accident. Red Cross certificates for this work will be issued.

Intensive training in first aid is a part of the participation of the national Red Cross program. England is finding its first aid pro-

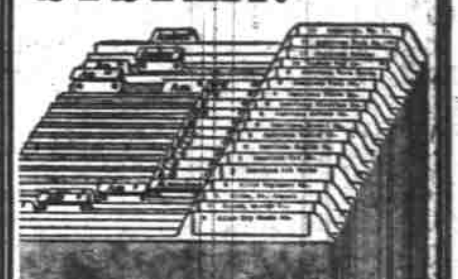
Portlanders Plan Visit to Capitol

A committee was also appointed to include Ronald Jones and legislative chairman of all organizations. This group will check on all legislation going through the present session which effects the patriotic organizations.

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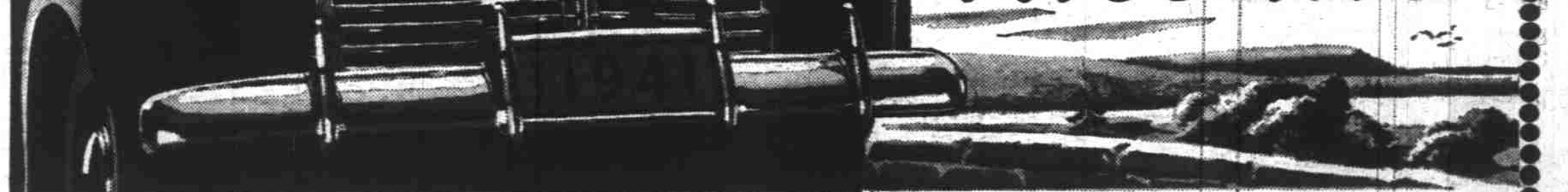


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
