Ex-Prep Stars on Stater's Roster; Additional Seats Set up

The mad-dashing, high-scoring Vikes of Salem high step out of prep competition to take on Bill McKallip's Oregon State Rooks here Tuesday night.

Harold Hauk's hoop-harassers will go against the cream of last year's high school crop, including All-State Lewis Beck of Pendleton, Bob McKee of Salem, Ben Atwood of Astoria, Glen Warren of Corvallis and Eldon Schuber of Molalla.

The Beaver yearlings, who invaded Salem undefeated, will probably get their severest test so far from the Vikes, who boast a record of seven wins in eight times out and a scoring average of 44.8 points per game.

Additional seats, all on the lower floor, are arranged for the contest. Director of Athletics Vern Gilmore said yesterday.

Coach Harold Hauk will probably attack with the lineup that has played a major share of the games thus far. It includes Bud Coons and Don Bower at guards, Bob Irish at center and Dutch Simmons and Eddie Salstrom at forwards.

The game is slated for 8 p.m., preceded at 6:30 by a clash between the Jayvees and an unnamed opponent.

Bank, Tessier Follow Twogood In Purge of Idaho's Athletic Department; Effective July 1

MOSCOW, Idaho, Jan. 18.—(AP)—The upheaval in the University of Idaho athletic department, which began January 7 with the resignation of Forrest Twogood as basketball and baseball mentor, brought notice today of the removal of Athletic Director Ted Bank and Assistant Football Coach Bob Tessier.

Pres. Harrison C. Dale announced that "Bank will not be connected with the university in any capacity during the college year 1941-42" and that the "position of assistant football coach, now held by Mr. Tessier, has been declared vacant, effective July 1."

Bank came to Idaho from Tulane university in the fall of 1935, bringing Tessier as assistant. His present contract as athletic director and head football coach, a three-year arrangement, expires September 1 of this year.

Formal Statement In a formal statement that gave no reason for the action, Dale said Bank would "not continue as athletic director and head football coach after termination of his appointment September 1, 1941, adding:

"A committee comprising the faculty athletic committee and representative alumni and students is being set up to make recommendations for the positions now held by Mr. Bank and Mr. Tessier.

"Future separation of the directorship of athletics from the position of head football coach is a strong possibility. Bank will receive favorable consideration for the position of athletic director if he should be interested."

Dale, asked about the conflict between the statement that Bank would not continue as athletic director and a later assertion that he would receive "consideration" for the post, said he had "no comment" to make beyond the formal statement.

Bank, although saying he had "nothing to say," added the announcement was "not unexpected."

Tessier, however, declared he could "understand why Ted was fired when there was little complaint about the football season."

"There seemed to be a sudden change in political opinion," he continued, adding that his own dismissal was "no surprise—I expected to go if Ted was let out."

Each said he had no plans beyond the termination date announced by Dale, but Tessier said he would "go with Ted if possible."

Dale named a committee Wednesday, headed by Dean T. S. Kerr, Idaho's co-sport conference representative and athletic committee chairman, to select a successor for Twogood. He did not state whether this committee also would be the one to act on the football coaching position.

Bank graduated from the University of Michigan in 1923. Tessier graduated from Tulane in 1935.

MOSCOW, Idaho, Jan. 18.—(AP)—A desperation toss by Jim Zimmerman in the fading seconds of a tight basketball game handed Washington State college a 24 to 23 victory over the University of Idaho tonight in the first of their four 1941 tussles.

The winners also held a one-point margin at the half, 12-13. Zimmerman was rushed into the game during the final minute by Coach Jack Friel when Idaho, by playing the brakes to the state "fire department" style with an airtight defense, edged into a one-point lead on a free toss by Harris.

Taking the ball on a toss-in from out of bounds, Zimmerman fired a quick shot from the corner and it found the loop for the winning points.

A crowd of 3500—almost a record for the Idaho gym—turned out to see Coach Forrest Twogood's Idaho Vandals make their first home stand since his resignation was announced last week.

They saw a defensively brilliant Idaho team force State's racing giants to slow to a cautious canter. There was no scoring for three minutes at the end of two minutes the count was tied at two points each.

Gaining the lead quickly after the halftime on a long toss by Merlyn Anderson, Idaho held the count at 14-13 for five minutes. Then Marv Pilberg and Vern Butts connected for State and the count moved swiftly to 18-15 for the Staters, but Idaho stepped in from again at 20-18 when Ron Harris began a scoring spurge.

From there on Harris was bad news to State's Cougars. Making six of his seven points in the last five minutes, his two free tosses tied the score at 22-21 after Ray Sundquist had sent State back into the lead, and another charity pitch by Harris gave Idaho its final tally for a one-point advantage with but a minute left to play.

That was Zimmerman's cue, and his only field goal of the evening headed State the triumph.

Ray Turner, caging 11 points for Idaho, led the scoring. Sundquist topped the State lineup with six.

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Gallagher Sparks Final Half Drive to Bag Game

With eight minutes of the final session played, alim Sum Gallagher went on a basket binge that enabled Willamette's basketball Bearcats to overcome a substantial lead held by Multnomah club and drive down the stretch to a 52 to 45 win here last night.

Clint Cameron, Russ Satter and Gallagher had nrowed a 23-29 halftime deficit to 34-35 as the clock ticked over the eight minute mark in the final half, and that was a signal for Gallagher to begin galloping.

He chucked in a crippler on Robertson's smooth pass to send the Salem collegians into the lead for the first time in the ball game, 36-35, and then avished a left-handed pivot shot to up the advantage two more points. Mitchell, MAC forward, pushed home a rebound, but Gallagher poked true from the corner and Cameron on fast break layed in another. That brought the count to 42-37 in Willamette's favor, and the 'Cats charged on to increase the margin of victory by two points in the last five minutes.

Outplayed First Half The 'Cats were sadly outplayed in the first canto, on the floor and off the backboards. Ivers, lanky towhead who handled pivot chores for the Clubmen, pocketed five field tips in the half to head a miraculous shooting exhibition that had Willamette on the short end of a 16-4 score at one time.

Howard Eberly, regular Bearcat center, was lost midway of the first half when he injured a knee while charging a loose ball into the bleachers. Extent of his injury couldn't be learned last night.

Gallagher and Cameron of the 'Cats tied with Ivers of the Clubbers for point amazing honors, each with 13, while Jimmy Robertson of the Bearcats and Mitchell of MAC each tanked 12.

The box score shows the Bearcats really won the game at the foul line. Each team bucketed 20 field goals but Willamette made good 12 of 21 gift shots to five out of 15 for the Clubbers.

It was the third win of the week for the 'Cats, who take a vacation from hoop wars during the examination period. Their next scheduled game was with Linfield, January 29.
