Opera Scheduled For Portland

The La Scala Opera company of Hollywood, California, announces a season of grand opera to be held in Portland on February 19, 20 and 21.

The company, which has already presented more than 600 operatic productions in this country, will have a chorus of 100 voices, a symphony orchestra and special ballets for all performances. Operas scheduled are "Carmen" on February 19, the double bill "Pagliacci" and "Cavalleria Rusticana" on February 20 and "La Traviata" on February 21.

Recently the La Scala opera presented a gala production of "Aida" at the Pasadena Rose Bowl, and recorded 32,000 paid admissions. The conductor of the performance was Pietro Cimini, who directed the opera sequences for Grace Moore's films, and the vocal star of the evening was Richard Bonelli of the Metropolitan.

Already announced for the Portland season are Rodolfo Hoyos, baritone of the famous Colon theatre in Buenos Aires; Giovanni Zavatelli, Italian tenor who has been proclaimed by leading critics as "phenomenal," and Vincenzo La Salle, lyric tenor, whose work in southern California has attracted the attention of motion picture companies.

The opera season, which is thus far the only one scheduled for Portland this winter, is creating considerable enthusiasm in the Rose city.

Ice Creams now Simple Desserts for Family's Everyday Dinner Menus

Present day icebox desserts are easy on the cook, easy on the pocketbook and easy on the figure. With but a few egg whites and add to fruit juice and you have a sherbet, or mix a dash of chocolate with some evaporated milk and you've a nice rich ice cream.

Canned whole-fruit juices, which come slightly seasoned with lemon juice, are one of the newer developments that prove a good investment for the busy housewife. Pear, peach and apricot are popular flavorings. Here's one recipe for using pear:

PEAR NECTAR ICE BOX PUDDING

1 1/2 cups pear nectar
1 cup granulated sugar
2 tablespoons lemon juice
Few grains salt
4 teaspoons plain gelatine
2 tablespoons cold water
1 cup whipping cream
1 7-ounce sponge cake
Currant or other tart jelly
Whipped cream for frosting

Combine nectar, sugar, lemon juice and salt and heat to boiling. Moisten gelatine in water, add to hot mixture and stir to dissolve. Chill until thick but not firm. Whip cream and fold into gelatine mixture. Line bottom and sides of a deep layer cake pan or mold (about 8 1/2 inches across top and 1 1/4 inches deep) with thin slices of cake. Spread cake with jelly. Pour in nectar-gelatin mixture and cover with jelly-spread cake (jelly side down); Chill until firm. Unmold and frost with flavored sweetened whipped cream. For variation, use apricot, plum, peach or peach-nectarine nectar of the whole-fruit variety. Serves 6 to 8.

And here's one that will make up into a nice simple dessert, another fruit flavored one:

ICEBOX CAKE
(First course or last)

1 tablespoon unflavored gelatine
1/2 cup cold water
1/2 cup sugar
1 cup boiling water
2 cups grapefruit juice
1/2 cup lemon juice
1 egg white

Soak gelatine in cold water; dissolve gelatine and sugar in boiling water; cool. Add fruit juices. Freeze to a mush. Add to beaten egg white, and mix thoroughly, return to freezing tray and continue freezing until firm. Makes 6 servings. Put in glasses in which have been arranged cold cream or jelly baked vanilla wafers.

Or there's the type that uses sweetened evaporated milk for richness.

CHOCOLATE ICE CREAM
(Serves 6)

1 square unsweetened chocolate
1/2 cup sweetened condensed milk
1/2 cup water
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup whipping cream

Melt chocolate in top of double boiler. Add condensed milk and stir over rapidly boiling water 5 minutes until thick. Add water and mix well. Chill. Add vanilla. Whip cream to custard-like consistency. Fold into chilled mixture. Freeze in freezing unit of refrigerator until half frozen. Scrape from freezing tray. Beat until smooth, but not melted. Replace in unit until frozen.

Double Boiler Is Quick Cooker

Double boiler meringue suits many an occasion, when a short time only is allotted to the dessert preparation.

THREE-MINUTE MERINGUE

2 egg whites, unbeaten
1/2 cup sugar
Dash of salt
2 tablespoons water
Few drops vanilla or almond extract

Put egg whites, sugar, salt and water in upper part of double boiler. Beat with rotary egg beater until thoroughly mixed. Place over rapidly boiling water and beat 1 minute; then remove from fire, and continue beating 2 minutes longer, or until mixture will stand in peaks. All flavoring. Beat well. Spread over top of jellied fruit pies or tarts. Sprinkle with shredded coconut, if desired.

Place ham in greased baking dish. Remove skins from onions and cut two gashes in the root ends. Sprinkle lightly with salt and generously with paprika. Put 1 teaspoon of butter and 1 teaspoon of brown sugar on top of each onion. Arrange them in dish around ham slice. Pour consommé over onions to a depth of 1/4 inch. Bake, covered, with the electric thermostat set at 350 degrees, for 1 1/2 hours.
