Stock Market Still in Rut

Ticker Tape Almost Halts During President's Inaugural

NEW YORK, Jan. 20-(P)-For the eighth consecutive session the stock market today was unable to crawl out of the rut.

While packing company issues and a handful of industrial favorites managed to finish on the rising side, leaders generally were down fractions to a point or so.

Offerings, however, never were rgent. Transfers of 377,280 hares were the smallest for any 5-hour proceedings since October 33. They compared with 575,280 last Friday.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off .1 of a point t 43.7. That was exactly where t started 1941. All the new year dvance had been wiped out. The composite has not shown a plus sign since January 10.

Narrowness of the day's performance was exemplified by the fact that, out of 1233 listed isues, only 633 were traded.

The ticker tape almost came to a standstill during the presient's inaugural address in which the attention of financial offices was concentrated. When it was concluded the market resumed its indifferent ramble.

Big inventories of packing conterns, combined with rising meat rices, aided stocks in this group. Another upturn in this week's steel mill operations to a new record high for ingot production brought scant response from the metal shapes. US Steel ended with gain of % but Bethlehem and oungstown Sheet were off fractionally.

Up as much as a point or more were Cudahy, Swift and Armour common and preferred. Clinging o modest gains also were General Electric, Air Reduction, American Can, Eastman Kodak and Chesapeake & Ohio.




