Ask Straighter Road—A delegation comprising Joseph and John Gaffke, George Vols, Oscar Sotera and Adam Vascator, Tuesday asked the Marion county court to straighten the road through the Pudding River bottoms a distance of a mile and a half from the Nason bridge to the Mt. Angel road. Sharp curves, blind corners and narrow right of way have made the road hazardous for travel, they pointed out, and have made daily progress of a school bus through the district unusually difficult. Members of the court indicated that they would inspect the length of road in question, and would recommend improvement if they found it justified.

Increase Shown—Salem ranked seventh in a survey of building and construction activity for 1940 in cities of the northwest having from 15,000 to 100,000 population. Salem showed a total gain of 71 per cent over the 1939 figure and a dwelling gain of 23 per cent. Building permits for 1940 in Salem totaled \$1,637,854. Aberdeen led with a total percentage gain of 144, but 1940 permits issued equaled only \$363,668. Eugene ranked sixth.

Judge Grants Motion to File New Complaint by Liquor Board

Circuit Judge L. G. Lowell Tuesday granted a motion of the plaintiff to file a supplemental complaint in the case of the state liquor commission vs. Ray Samuel Maynard and others, and also ordered the case held for trial at a later date than January 23 as originally docketed.

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Counties Share Bridge Expense

Marion and Linn Courts Agree on Demolition of Span at Gates

Marion and Linn counties will share equally the expense of tearing down the old bridge over the North Santiam river at Gates and in the construction of the new span already contracted for with the Johnston company of Newburg, members of the courts of the two counties agreed here Tuesday.

Work in destroying the old bridge and its approaches will be in charge of Engineer N. C. Hubbs of Marion county, the courts agreed, with the understanding that portions of the work on the Linn side will be carried out by workmen under the direction of that county's engineer.

Blasting will be necessary on the south side of the river to make suitable approaches to the new bridge through a rock bench forming the bank of the stream, Linn officials pointed out, and this will be undertaken before construction of the new bridge begins.

The division of work and supervision agreed upon by the two courts is consistent with an older agreement made by previous county courts in both counties where Linn county would supervise work on the Meham and Greens bridges, and Marion county would assume similar responsibilities on the Gates, Mill City and Jefferson bridges.

Expenses on all five spans are shared equally by the two counties in accordance with old agreements.

Englewood Church Has Anniversary

Bishop Ura D. Warner of the Pacific area of the United Brethren denomination will be in Salem Friday night for the sixth anniversary of the Englewood church of the United Brethren in Christ, 17th and Nebraska avenue.

Englewood church was founded in the 400 block on Marion street in 1908 with 25 members. Later it was moved to the present location and named Castle chapel in memory of Bishop Castle. In 1935 the building which now houses the congregation was constructed and named Englewood United Brethren after the community.
