

Lebanon Plans Defense Class

Free Course Offered Local Youth; Bank Director Elected 33rd Time

LEBANON — In cooperation with the national defense board, the Lebanon school board at its last meeting decided to open the school shops to youths between the ages of 17 and 24 years who wish to take such courses in woodworking and automobile and tractor mechanics as is planned by the national defense board.

Classes will be held after school hours on nights and Saturdays. Howard Hickox, who teaches manual arts in the high school, will handle the classes in woodwork. Some local mechanics will be found to teach the machine work.

The courses will be free and no obligation to do any sort of work afterward is involved.

Paul Middlebrook, manager of the local paper mill, Donald Phelps, president of the pulp and paper makers' union in Lebanon, Daniel Aston and Eldon Cray, ranchers, will make up a committee to advise with authorities and students.

Safety School Is Slated, Stayton

Adults and Minors to Be Given Driving Lessons for 6 Weeks

STAYTON—Under auspices of Earl Snell, secretary of state, students and adults of this vicinity will be offered a six weeks' safety driving course beginning Friday afternoon. Mr. Snell sponsors these schools as a part of his statewide traffic safety program.

Those taking the course must provide his own car and must make arrangements to have it driven to and from the school by a licensed operator. Students 15 years of age or older are eligible to enroll, and also adults who wish to learn to drive or who wish to improve driving technique. Registrations are to be left at the high school.

No driver's license is required for the course, but students are advised to take out learner's permits to enable them to practice.

Classes are held each week during the course, one phase of driving being taken up at each session. Between classes, students are expected to practice in order to meter various steps as they go along. A competent instructor is in charge of the work and parents are invited to attend any class.

Instruction is given in the proper method of starting a motor, use of the clutch, shifting gears, turning and backing, parallel parking, stopping and starting on hills and general care of the car.

At the first session, the instructor outlines the work to be covered in the school and discusses rules and regulations pertaining to the operation of motor vehicles in Oregon.

All subsequent classes feature instruction with the student at the wheel of his car.

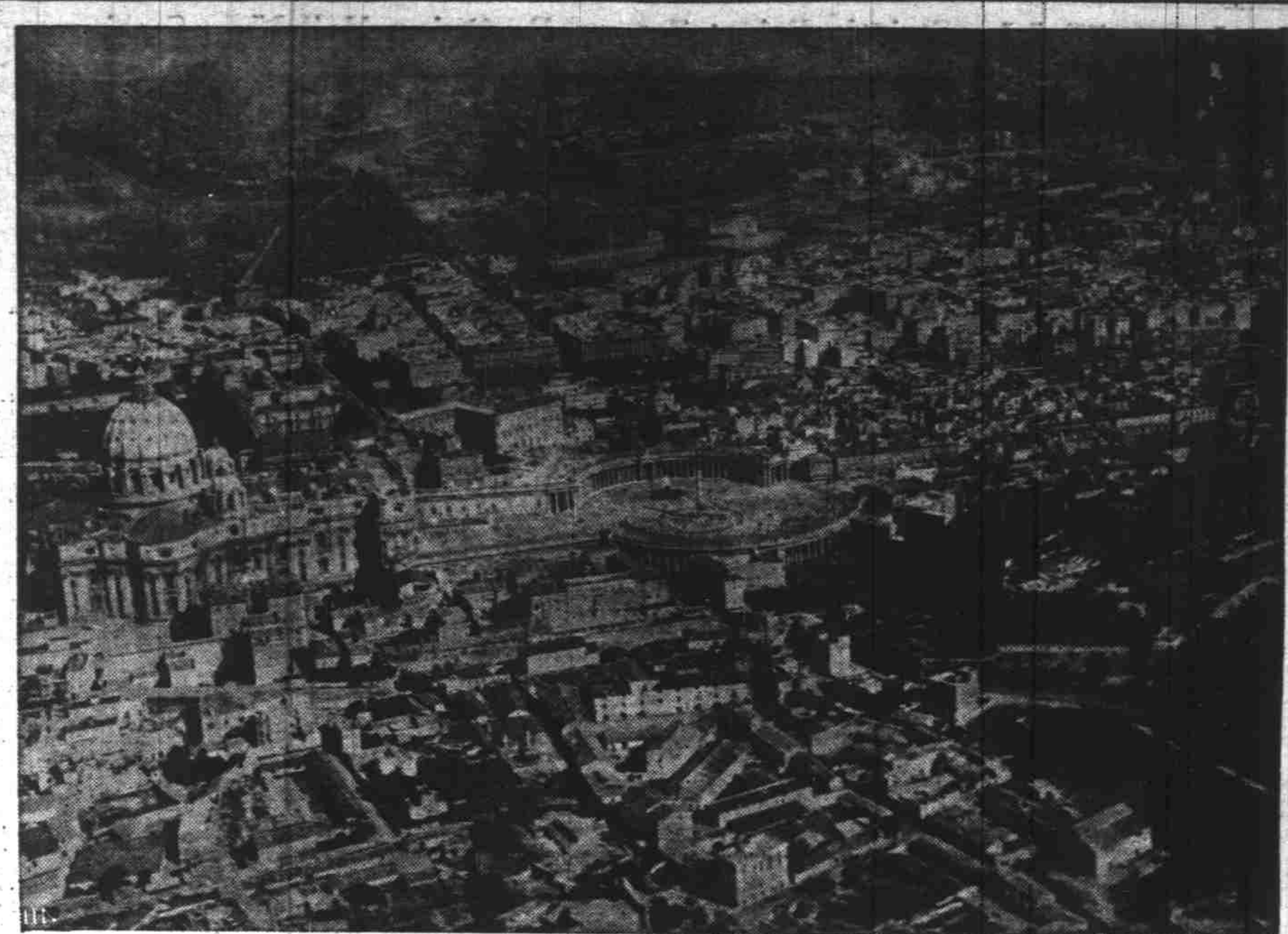
