

Pulp and Paper Have Good Year

Most Profitable Period Since Depression, Says Leadbetter

Last year, 1940, was the most profitable of any since the depression for the Oregon pulp and paper company, F. W. Leadbetter, president, told the stockholders at a meeting Thursday.

Gross sales of products totaled \$3,600,000, about \$1,000,000 more than for 1939. Net profits after normal income taxes and depreciation were deducted were \$361,390, and after deduction of excess profits tax will be between \$250,000 and \$300,000. In 1939 there was a deficit.

There is a cash balance on hand of \$350,000, with all bank indebtedness paid up and six months of raw materials and supplies on hand.

The plant capacity is greater than ever before to handle orders which are materializing now and which are expected to insure full operation rather than the present four days per week.

Leadbetter said the company expects to bring interest payments on the 5 per cent bonds up to date in June with the paying of two years' interest, as well as retiring of \$95,000 of bonds.

The board of directors and all officers were reelected with the exception of T. Osmond as vice-president, replacing the late General A. S. Fleming.

Draft Quotas in Latest State Call Announced to Local Draft Boards

The draft quotas for each local selective service board, involving the recent call for 980 Oregon men to report for military service between February 17 and March 8, were announced here Thursday. There are 57 local boards in the state.

The quotas for the period aggregate 971 men, since nine negroes, from board areas which have not been announced, also will be called.

Multnomah county board No. 1 will provide 35 men, the largest number of any board while Jefferson county's quota of two is the smallest in the state.

Selective service headquarters officials said the quotas announced Thursday are subject to change due to the fact that some boards may have sent men in the previous call who have been rejected. Such boards will have to make up for these men in the next call.

Road Officials "Talk" Budget

State highway department officials appeared before a group of joint ways and means members Thursday afternoon to discuss the highway commission's budget for the next biennium.

The budget, based on estimates, was fixed at \$31,573,000. This includes salaries and wages \$4,584,642, general operating maintenance \$5,032,358, capital outlays \$177,117,000 and special request \$5,239,000.

All revenues of the highway department were estimated at \$37,589,000. Contributions to the state police total \$714,904.

There is no state appropriation for the highway department, the revenues being derived from motor vehicle registrations, gasoline tax, fines, motor transportation fees and federal contributions.

Stand on Trucks Denied by Bench

Marion Court Would Back Association Should Question Arise

The present county court of Marion county has never taken formal action with regard to any proposed or rejected truck legislation by the state assembly, County Judge Leroy Hewlett stated Thursday.

In response to questions whether the present court had officially joined with 22 counties reported to be on record in opposition to truck legislation now before the legislature, the judge denied that

any such specific action had been taken by the present court.

The Marion county court would undoubtedly support the majority of Oregon counties in any such matter, especially if it were proposed through the Association of Oregon counties, of which this county is a member," the judge said.

"Since taking office early this month, however, the present court has not committed itself in any way on legislation of this sort."

The judge did indicate that the present court had liberalized log hauling regulations in Marion to allow transport of logs over oiled roads when economically necessary and when roads are properly safeguarded, but denied that other action had been taken on other phases of the trucking question.

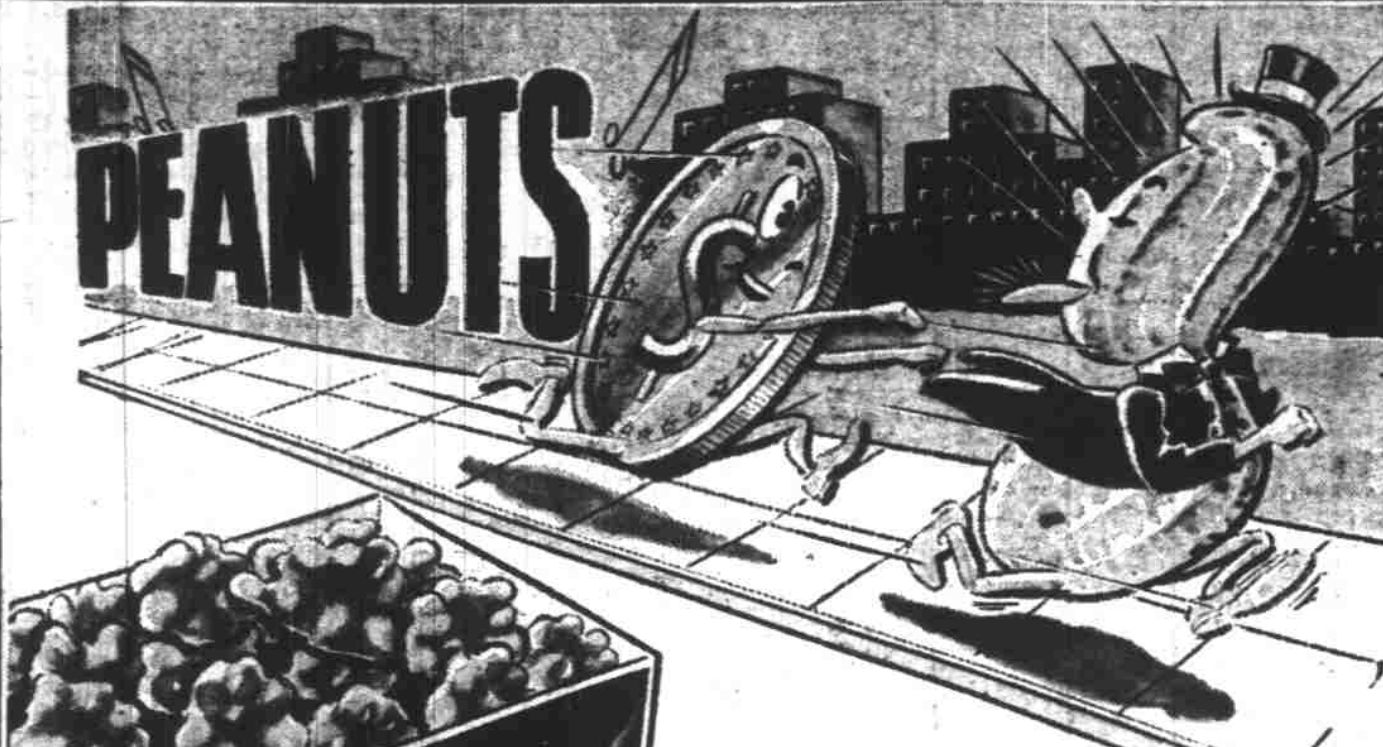

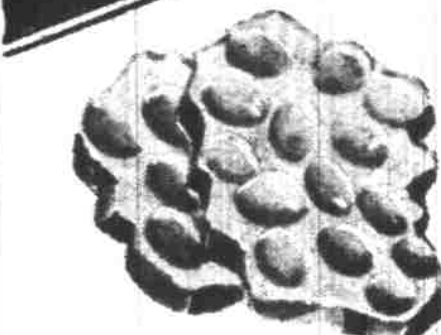

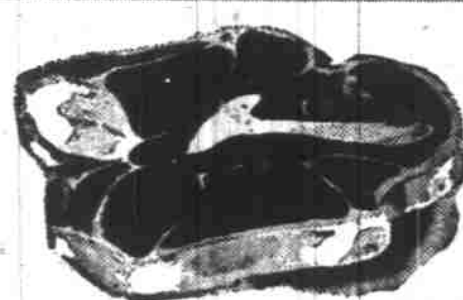
