Tazwell Files
Suit Demurrer

Defeated Probate Judge
Seeks Dismissal of
Claim by Smith

Attorneys representing Probate Judge George C. Tazwell, Multnomah county, Thursday filed a demurrer in the state supreme court here asking that the suit of Newton C. Smith, Portland attorney, attacking Tazwell's claim to the office, be dismissed. Smith recently was appointed by Governor Charles A. Sprague to succeed Tazwell.

Both sides were directed to file briefs and the demurrer probably will be argued within the next month.

Smith contends his appointment is valid while Tazwell claims he is entitled to serve until the next general election under a

constitutional provision. Judge John A. Mearns defeated Tazwell at the November election but was killed in an automobile accident before he qualified.

The constitutional provision cited by Tazwell provides that officers, other than members of the legislature, shall continue in office until their successors have been elected and qualified for service.

2 Oregon Youths
Held in Robbery

WILLITS, Calif., Jan. 23—AP—Three Oregon and Idaho youths were arrested at Ukiah, 25 miles south of here, less than an hour after holding up a local restaurant Thursday, Sheriff E. L. Williams reports.

The trio, the sheriff said, admitted stealing an automobile at Eugene, Ore., and holding up a Gold Hill, Ore., service station Wednesday night.

Williams identified the arrested youths as James M. Potter, 16, and Lee Davis, 17, both of Ashland, Ore., and Robert Johnson, 17, Emmett, Idaho. The Ashland boys told the sheriff they recently deserted from the 249th coast artillery at Camp Clapps, Ore.

The Ashland youths will be turned over to the Oregon officers while Johnson's case will be handled by Mendocino county authorities, the sheriff said.
