**Buying Based on Forecast** of Cold Wave and Rust Hazard

Rise One Cent

CHICAGO, Jan. 24-(AP)-Wheat futures contracts deliverable next summer rose as much as a cent a bushel today but gave up some of the gain later,

Buying was based partly on forecast of a cold wave and fear that rust in the far southwest may become a crop hazard later in the season. Spreading operations also added to the buying, with some dealers taking July and September and selling May or eliminating previous spreads made in the opposite direction. Traders said this accounted partly for the lagging of May contracts on the ad-

May wheat closed unchanged at 86-85 % but July and September finished 14-% higher at 8014-% and 80 1/2.

The weather bureau forecast abnormally low temperatures in the southwest as well as some other sections of the grain belt, although precipitation, probably in the form of snow protection, was promised. Attracting more attention, however, was the report of E. S. McFadden, government agronomist, that rust which developed last fall in southern Texas may become a "serious hazard" to the 1941 crop in other parts of the country.

Brokers said some buying may have been associated with cash wheat or flour business and it was understood Chinese interests were seeking Pacific coast flour.

## By Quinn Hall Slug Control Is Advised by Agent

Spring Seeding of Clover Reported Futile Unless Soil Is Pest Free

In issuing warnings to farmers that failure of spring seedings of red, alsike and white clover can be expected in many cases this year due to slug infestation of fields, W. G. Nibler, assistant county agent, said, "Young sprouting clover is to the slug what candy is to most children."

Spring seeding of clover during February and March into fall seeded grain is a rather common practice in the Willamette valley. Many of these fields may be rather badly infested with slugs, but they may not have shown up as yet because of no apparent damage to the grain. However, if the slugs are there, clover seedings do not have much of a chance to survive.

"It is my suggestion," Nibler, "that farmers planning to seed clover soon should make some effort first to determine whether or not they have slugs in their fields. This may save not only time but seed.'

The method suggested by the assistant agent is to apply a small amount of metaldehyde slug bait in a few different parts of the field for a test. If a number of slugs are found around the trials, seeding clover would appear to be hopeless. The only alternative would be to bait the entire field to get rid of the slug. previous to seeding, or to make other arrangements, such as seeding the clover alone late in the spring, after dry weather has halted slugs, or by using other forage crops.

It also would be well to keep an eye on fall seeded vetch, peas and clover, states Nibler, Slugs are expected to increase as the weather warms up, although crops will in most cases be bigger and more able to withstand injury. Slug damage as extensive as it has been this year has not been experienced here before, and the future cannot be foretold.


