Soldier Sent Back to Camp

Pleads Guilty to Store Burglary and Must Make Restitution
Arthur William Rosier waived appearance before the Marion county grand jury and pleaded guilty Monday to a charge of burglary not in a dwelling before Circuit Judge L. H. McMahon.

His case was continued for sentence by the court, and he was released on condition he report immediately to the captain of his company in the United States army at Camp Murray, Wash. He was also required to make restitution of property stolen from the Newman army goods store here recently at the rate of not less than \$10 monthly.

News From Fort Lewis

The American soldier is the aristocrat of the world and consequently there is a growing traffic problem at Fort Lewis which post officials are finding hard to solve.
The American soldier owns more automobiles than any other soldier in the world. At least 60 per cent of the men at Fort Lewis have their own transportation. Authorities are wondering what will happen to the streets of the reservation as the modern day army knocks off work, and every Saturday morning, when the soldier goes home for the weekend, traffic is held up for hours at a time.

Another problem which may soon cause trouble—the numerous radios. No tent is complete without one. They are overloading the wires, which were strung to supply only enough juice for one bulb per tent.
"We didn't figure on the radios," said reception center officials. "Nowadays, a draftee is given a radio when he leaves home instead of a bon voyage basket."

This is no egg-aggitation because we have the egg-act figures from the quartermaster's office, which are egg-plicit, to say the least.
The main reason why soldiers at Fort Lewis and Camp Murray don't get egg-battered while marching ten miles a day is because they eat 1,500,000 eggs each month.

The hen fruit is ordered from Washington and Oregon poultry houses, along with 28,000 pounds of bacon. Army cooks say a breakfast egg and bacon is extremely egg-battering.
Motorists traveling on the Pacific highway between the army encampments and Tacoma are often bewildered the first time they see the long steel boxes which run down the road on wheels, full of soldiers all sitting facing the windows.

The steel boxes are buses, which once saw better days at the World's fair in New York. The last of ten, shipped by flat car from the east, arrived on the military reservation a few days ago, for the private bus company which holds the Fort Lewis-Tacoma franchise.

Twenty five miles of colored concrete was received by the post quartermaster this week to be used as piping or cording of all hats on enlisted men in the Ninth corps.

A new army regulation calls for all overseas hats to have an identifying colored piping which will show in what department of the service the wearer of the hat belongs. Previously, only officers wore the identifying cord.

Color combinations which will soon be seen at Fort Lewis and Camp Murray are, gold and black for officers, silver and black for warrant officers, scarlet for artillery, yellow for cavalry, blue for infantry, scarlet and white for engineers.

Major General George A. White reports the first fruits of the 41st Division's new start morning to the new 41st Division commandant about February 15, and that several months would be required to move the entire division from the present tent camp on the shores of American lake.

Although the new cantonment, including more than 1000 semi-permanent buildings, will be under the same jurisdiction at Fort Lewis, General White said he would soon announce a new name for the camp to avoid confusion with Fort Lewis where the 3rd Division is located.

Premiere Set For 'Golgatha'

Picture Follows Narrative of Bible; Filming Cost Said Immense

The Judea of the motion picture "Golgatha" which will be shown at the First Presbyterian church Sunday, February 3, was erected in Algeria at immense cost. Archaeologists and designers saw to it that the half a score tall and gleaming structures ranging around a square were as created by Herod centuries ago. No fact which could add authenticity to the production was overlooked.

The musical score of "Golgatha" is in itself an achievement, catching every mood of the picture with a magic all its own. The symphony orchestra which provides the musical background for this all-talking film is under the direction of Jacques Ibert, noted French conductor.

The picture follows faithfully the Biblical narrative. Scenes portrayed include Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem, the driving of the merchants from the temple, the fears and plots of the Sanhedrin, the betrayal by Judas Iscariot, the Last Supper, the march to Calvary, the crucifixion . . . and then His last messages to His disciples after the Resurrection.

Such tremendous interest has been manifested in the showing of "Golgatha" that the Presbyterian church has arranged to present it at three separate showings on Sunday, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, 5 and 7:30 p.m.

Aeronautic Field Takes Local Boys

100 Marion County Youth Find Employment in Plane Assemblies

The aircraft industry has provided jobs for a large number of Marion county youth men during the last few months. Approximately 100 youths who had completed training courses in aviation sheet metal work at the Salem high school have been placed on jobs. These jobs include sheet metal layout, and in a United States citizen is eligible to take this training. The age group is between 18 and 25. All applicants must first be registered with the state employment service, and all referrals after completion of the course are handled through the employment service.

This training, however, does not guarantee a job, but does most certainly give the individual proper training for jobs that develop in the aircraft industry.

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
