

## Upset Food Pleases Cook

Somersault foods are those made or served upside down. They were novelties not so long ago, but their popularity has made them as common today as many other dainties. Here's an upside down cake recipe that is entitled to a place in anybody's special recipe file:

**COCONUT BUTTERSCOTCH UPSIDE DOWN CAKE**  
 1 1/2 cups sifted cake flour  
 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder  
 1/4 teaspoon salt  
 1/2 cup granulated sugar  
 4 tablespoons softened butter or other shortening  
 1 egg, well beaten  
 1/2 cup milk  
 1 teaspoon vanilla  
 6 tablespoons butter  
 1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed  
 1 tablespoon water  
 1 cup shredded coconut, toasted.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, salt, and sugar, and sift together three times. Add butter. Combine egg, milk, and vanilla. Add to flour mixture, stirring until all flour is dampened; then beat vigorously 1 minute.

Melt 6 tablespoons butter in 8x8-inch pan or 8-inch skillet over low flame. Add brown sugar and water and cook and stir until thoroughly mixed. Sprinkle coconut on this. Turn batter out of contents of pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) 50 minutes, or until done. Turn upside down on dish with coconut on top. Garnish with whipped cream, if desired.

## Today's Menu

Artichoke salad will be the day's beginning. The meal will close with fresh pears and cream.

**Artichoke salad**  
 Bacon, apple, sweet potato casserole  
 Asparagus  
 Pears and cream  
 Chocolate fudge cake

**DOWN SOUTH CASSEROLE**  
 4 medium sized sweet potatoes  
 2 apples  
 1/2 pound sliced bacon  
 Wash potatoes and boil in salted water until soft (20-30 minutes). Peel and arrange in greased casserole or baking dish. Core, pare and slice apples and place between potatoes. Arrange strips of bacon on top. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees) about 25 minutes, until bacon is crisp. Baste occasionally with bacon fat. Serves four.

## Braised Chops on Dinner Menu

Pork shoulder chops may be braised, that is pan browned in the fat that cooks out of the chop, then covered and cooked slowly until tender. A 1/4 to 1/2-inch chop will need about 30 minutes of this slow cooking. Uncover, season, and remove chops from pan. Add 1/2 cup tart jelly or apple sauce to drippings and heat, pour over the chops, or serve in a bowl with them.

With any pork, a tart accompaniment is desirable, such as tomatoes—fresh, sliced, baked, or pan broiled slices—applesauce, candied apple rings, or pan browned apple slices, cranberries, pickle relish, pickled peaches, grapeapples or orange slices.

## Budget Eased by Rice Dish

In mid-winter, when the budget is sorely taxed for the spring wardrobe, plan to serve dried peas for family dinners. Here is one recipe that will be practical.

**DRIED PEAS WITH RICE AND TOMATO**

1 1/2 cups rice  
 1 cup dried peas  
 1 onion  
 1 tablespoon salt  
 1/2 teaspoon pepper  
 2 cups tomatoes.

Soak the peas overnight. Cook until tender. Add the well washed rice, onions, tomatoes and seasoning. Cook twenty minutes or until rice is tender. Yield: 8 servings.

A "non-run" stocking is knit so it will not run in a ladder even though the threads may be snagged or broken. Women often expect that nylon stockings will not run. This is not so. If the threads break, nylon hose will run like any other hose because they are knit in the usual way.

Women who have been disappointed with the wear of regular knit hose will often find non-runs highly satisfactory. In buying them, remember that nightly washing is important in helping any type of stocking to wear better.

Lots of people like tapioca puddings, especially when there's a child or two in the family. Here is a very good variation for supper: Let 6 out up marshmallows stand with 1/4 cup crushed pineapple and 1 teaspoon lemon juice for about an hour. Just before ready to serve fold the fruit mixture into a recipe for plain pudding that has cooled.

Most cotton gloves will shrink somewhat, and allowance in size should be made for this. Cotton gloves should fit loosely when bought. Shrinking, felting and matting of wool gloves in washing is avoidable and can be prevented or minimized by avoiding all rubbing or twisting, and by using cool mild suds.

## Some Simple Pointers Given on How To Shop for Turkish Towels

As an aid to women shoppers who take advantage of white sales, the Cotton-Textile Institute has prepared the following list of points to guide them in the selection of towels.

For durability a towel must have a firmly woven ground that will hold the tiny surface loops in place, take the strain of pulling, and serve as a sponge for water taken up by the loops. Hold the towel in front of a strong light. If only pin holes of light seep through, the ground cloth is closely woven; if splashes of light seep through, the ground weave is too loose to take long wear. Best-wearing towels have a ground warp of two-ply (that is, two yarns twisted into one).

Absorbency is as important a factor as durability. The more loops per square inch of drying surface, the more absorbent the towel. For maximum absorbency the towel should be made of soft, evenly spun cotton with a minimum of twist in the yarn. White towels are most absorbent; pastels, next; deep tones, least.

Hems should be turned back neatly, stitched firmly with fine stitches, and corners backstitched

to prevent unraveling. Selvages should be firmly and closely woven, because they are subject to greater wear and tear than any other part.

To insure color fastness, inquire if the towel has been vat dyed. Another point about color to keep in mind is that colored lines and bands increase the cost only slightly; solid colors add considerably to price; and floral and scroll patterns, which have to be woven on Jacquard looms, are the most expensive.
