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Silverton Road Funds \$40,000

A total of \$40,000 will be available for improvement of the Silverton road from the Middle Grove school eastward to the Central Howell school, the Marion county court was informed Thursday in a letter received from Hods Swart, state highway commissioner, engineer in charge of surveys on the road in question.

The amount stated reduces by half the sum of \$80,000 reported several weeks ago as to be made available for improvement of the Salem-Silverton highway in 1941.

Although improvements will not extend so far, the road will be surveyed all the way to Silverton, Swart indicated, and suggestions made by the county court or others as to location of the improved road will be received with appreciation.
