

### Survey Slated For Silverton

Information Compiled for Industrial Sites and Market Facilities

SILVERTON — At a special meeting of members of the Silverton chamber of commerce called late Friday afternoon by President S. P. Rose plans were laid to make an industrial survey of Silverton in cooperation with the market development section of the Bonneville administration.

This information will be compiled very similarly to that already compiled in book form on the Columbia river area. E. C. Royer has been made general chairman of the industrial survey committee.

The survey will include many phases of the town such as the distance to and method of reaching water transportation, water supply, railroad and highway transportation, sewer disposal, fuel, labor resources and organizations, public safety, hospitalization, urban and suburban housing facilities, policing, timber and agricultural resources, present manufacturing plants, sites for future industrial enterprises and industrial buildings.
