Supreme Court Appeal Is Lost State Jurists Hand Down Opinions on Three Other Actions

J. H. Lauterman, defendant in a civil action tried in Polk county circuit court, lost his appeal in the Oregon supreme court Tuesday when an opinion by Justice Bailey affirmed Circuit Judge Arlie G. Walker, Mr. and Mrs. Dan Sidons were plaintiffs.

In another opinion the supreme court ruled that Barbara Jackman, Klamath county, was entitled to \$75 a month alimony from the estate of her divorced husband, Jack H. Grafton, who was killed in an automobile crash a month ago. This opinion affirmed Circuit Judge Edward B. Ashurst of Klamath county.

Other opinions: Herwin Winter and others vs. William C. Winters, administrator of the estate of Herman Winters, and others, appellants. Appeal from Multnomah county. Suit to impress a trust on two blocks of bonds held by the estate. Opinion by Chief Justice Kelly, Judge James F. Stapleton affirmed.

James B. Hamilton vs. George W. Finch, appellant. Appeal from Multnomah county in auto accident damage case. Opinion by Justice Lusk, Judge Jacob Kanzer reversed.
