

Silverton Fights Attempt to Withdraw Water From Silver Creek

Clubs Protest House Bill 298

Resolution Handed Senate and House, Protection for Park Sought

"We won't push this bill until I contact the Silverton people," Rep. George R. Duncan of Stayton advised The Statesman Friday with regard to his measure to permit impounding of waters of Silver Creek under certain restrictions.

Duncan said he had not realized when he introduced the bill that Silverton utilizes Silver creek for a municipal, recreational and industrial water supply. The measure was intended to enable experiment with the possibilities of utilizing the stream for irrigation with surplus high water.

Strawberry growers who wanted the bill enacted also intend to confer with Silverton leaders, Duncan said.

SILVERTON—House bill 298, providing for withdrawal of water from Silver creek for irrigation purposes, was vigorously protested Thursday in a communication sent to the senate and house by presidents of five different local clubs, and City Manager E. L. McCleary. Signatories to the protest include, McCleary, S. Parzy Rose, president of the chamber of commerce; Earl J. Adams, president of Rotary club; Dr. P. A. Loar, president of the Silverton Planning council; C. H. Dickerson, president of the Silverton Lions club and Clark Backman, president of the Isaac Walton league.

The resolution gives reasons for its protest to include: "There are no surplus waters in said Silver Creek over and above the needs of the Silver Falls State park vested rights and rights of riparian owners and the needs of the Silver Creek basin. Silver Creek is one of the main sources for water for the city of Silverton, its municipal water system, swimming pools, industries, existing and contemplated depend upon Silver Creek. Silver Creek in the Silver Creek basin and Pudding river are dotted with vested water rights and many irrigation projects already established and many others contemplated, all depending on Silver Creek for water. Withdrawal from Silver Creek of the alleged surplus waters will result in irreparable damage to the Silver Falls State park which is rapidly becoming nationally known as one of the grandest recreational spots in the United States."

City officials state that loose dogs are numerous within the city limits, and that many complaints have come from housewives concerning the damage done to lawns and shrubbery. Other residents resent having nocturnal slumbers disturbed by nightly howlings, officials say.
