

Mill Installs 100 HP Motor

**Independence Company
Changes From Steam to
Electric Power**

INDEPENDENCE—A new 100 horsepower electric motor was installed at the Cooper saw mill this week, where 20 men are now employed in the mill and like number in the woods. The mill operates 53 hours a week. The planer has been operated with steam from the boiler which operates the mill, but now runs with electric power furnished by the huge motor.

The mill has been operating here since a year ago last fall and has been running steadily since, with the exception of a short shut-down on account of lack of logs and when repairs were needed.

INDEPENDENCE—Skewis and Judson of Salem were given a contract to install steam heating from the new high school boiler room to heat the old high school building and the gymnasium by the Independence school board Tuesday.

The contract includes the installation and furnishing of materials to heat both buildings and to replace the hot air furnace, as well as the stove which provides hot water for showers. Work must be completed by May 15.

MONMOUTH—Monmouth is to have automatic community dial telephone service starting next October, according to announcement made here this week by W. S. Wade, Portland, traffic manager, and H. V. Collins, Salem, district manager of Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company. The new system will operate through the Salem office. Farmer line customers may change to dial operation if they choose. The project for Monmouth is to cost about \$23,000, according to authorities of the company.

Local operators, who live here, are all to be placed elsewhere.

Weaving Guild Names Leaders

**Mt. Angel Co-op now Pays
50 per Cent Dividends
to Charter Members**

MT. ANGEL—Mr. Angel Weaving Guild cooperative held its annual election of officers Thursday with Mrs. Valerie Beggs again receiving the office of president. Mrs. Florence Epping was re-elected vice-president and weaving director. Miss Dorothy Dieker was chosen secretary-treasurer, and Miss Clara Duda, Miss Minnie Weis and Mrs. Thillie Shepherd named directors.

The baby co-op has progressed considerably in the last year, and has now arisen to the financial status where a 50 per cent dividend of the receipts for the sale of linen articles is returned to charter members. The other 50 per cent is retained by the guild as a revolving fund for the purpose of purchasing new material and the upkeep of the guild. New members will receive 25 per cent for the first year of their membership and thereafter be paid on the same basis as the charter members.

Mrs. Epping conducts classes every Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday from 2 to 5. Since there are only nine looms only a limited number can be admitted at one time, because all members must take the complete course in weaving before another group is started. It is imperative that the work turned out must be of the highest class and only skilled weavers can be permitted to weave the articles to be sold.

One of the original ideas in forming the guild was to promote the weaving in individual homes. This takes time as the loom must be purchased by the weaver for none of the guild's looms may be removed to private homes. Mrs. Epping and Mrs. Beggs now each have a loom. These are the new folding type made by the Ganzmiller Loom company of Portland.

Articles woven by the guild members are aprons, towels, luncheon sets, dresser scarfs, finger towels and cocktail napkins. The products are sold to Timberline Lodge, the Iris Shop in Portland and a firm in New York. A new outlet from which big results are expected is the Better Bedding Store in Salem with whom a contract has lately been made.

GRAND ISLAND—Clarence U. Badger, long time resident of the Island district, died Thursday afternoon at the McMinnville hospital following a heart attack. He had been in poor health for the past year but became seriously ill Wednesday.
