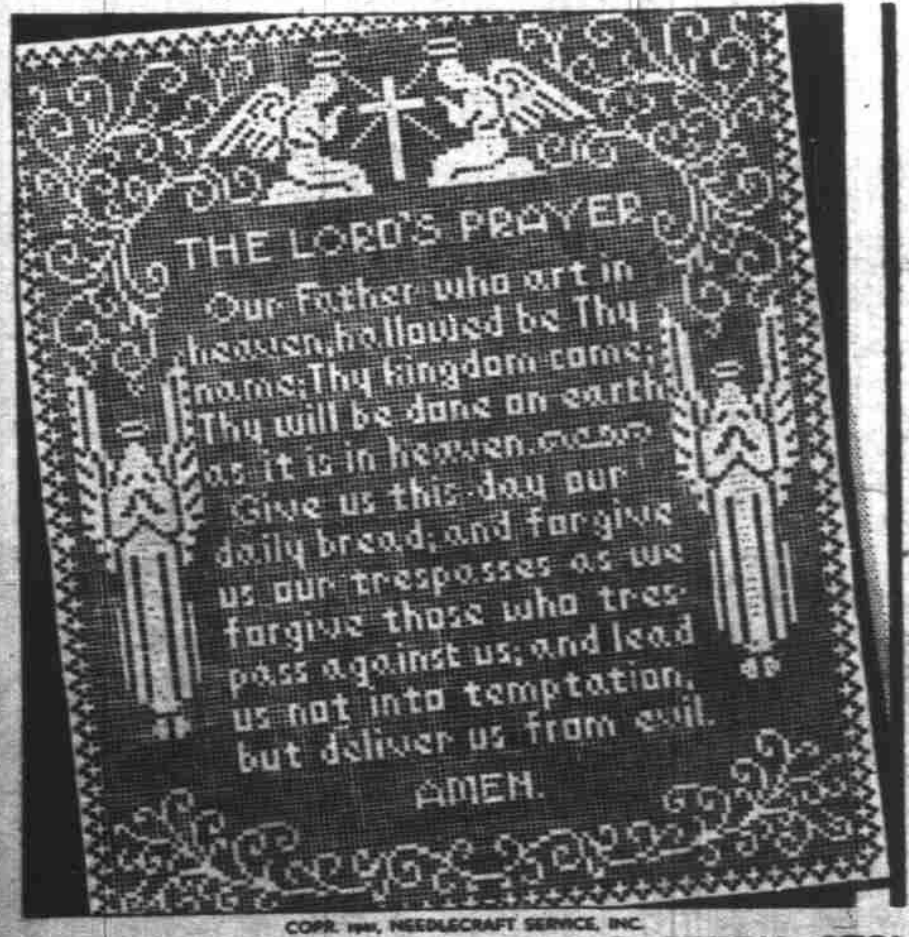

Today's Menu

Menu for today will include an excellent pot roast.
Avacado on half shell
Spicy pot roast
Holloed potatoes
Bran muffins
Buttered carrots and peas
Sour cherry pie

SPICY POT ROAST
(8 to 10 servings)
4 pounds round, rump, or chuck beef
1 pint vinegar
1 quart water
10 cloves
12 peppercorns
3 bay leaves
Flour
Salt
Pepper
Allspice
2 tablespoons fat
2 cups sliced carrots
1 quart sliced onion
12 ginger snaps
1 tablespoon sugar
Buy well-fatted beef. Wipe. Four vinegar and water over meat. Add water to cover. Add cloves, peppercorns, and bay leaves. Cover. Keep cold for three days. Remove meat from liquid. Season. Dredge with flour and brown thoroughly in the lard in a heavy kettle. Add carrots, onions, and 2 cups of vinegar liquid in which meat was soaked. Cover. Simmer (don't boil) about three hours. Add crushed ginger snaps and sugar. Simmer about 10 minutes.
