

Buy well-fatted beef. Wipe. Pour vinegar and water over meat. Add water to cover. Add cloves, peppercorns, and bay leaves. Cover. Keep cold for three days. Remove meat from liquid. Season. Dredge with flour and brown thoroughly in the lard in a heavy kettle. Add carrots, onions, and 2 cups of vinegar liquid in which meat was soaked. Cover. Simmer (don't boil) about three hours. Add crushed gingersnaps
