

1 cup sugar 3 eggs, well beaten

1/2 cup finely cut dates 1/2 cup chopped walnut meats, toasted 1 teaspoon vanilla

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again Add butter to chocolate and eggs, beating throughly; then chocolate mixture and blend. Add flour and mix well; then dates. nuts and vanilla. Bake in two greased pans, 8x8x2-inches, in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) removing from pan. Makes 4 dozen Indians.
