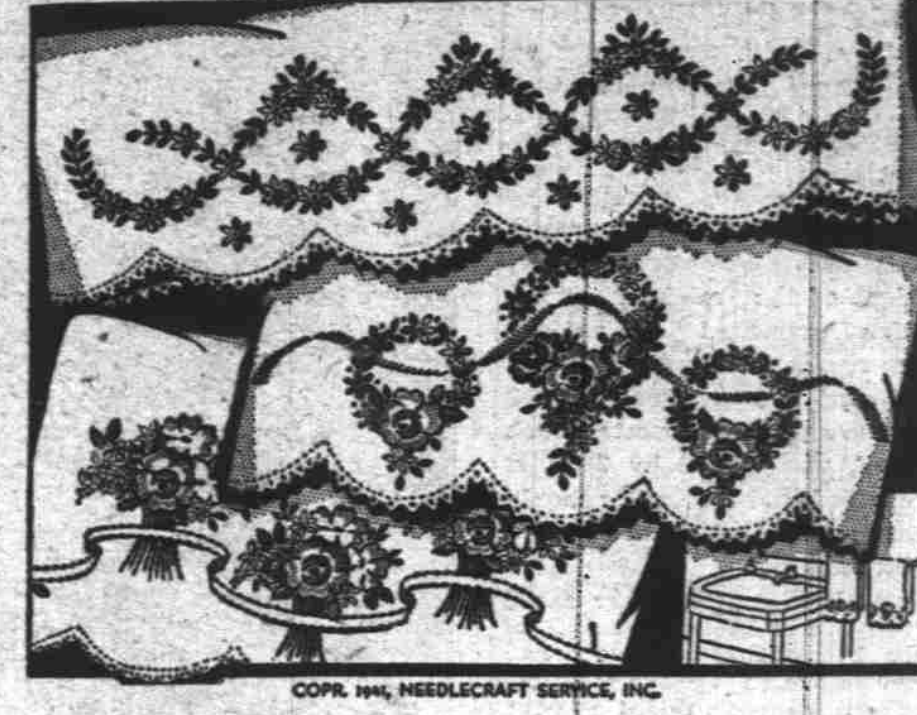
Poetry Study Club Meets
