

Breach of Contract Verdict Awards Plaintiff \$400 In Less Than Hour

Circuit Court Jury Acts Quickly in Suit; Judgment Includes Interest From 1932; Case Takes Only Part of Day

A verdict of \$400 for the plaintiff was returned Friday by a jury in circuit court less than an hour after it retired from the courtroom in the case of Ruby Richter vs. George H. Stoddard. The case went on trial during the morning session of court.

Selection of a jury and presenta-1 tion of testimony were rapid, and the case went to the jury shortly after the lunch hour. The written verdiet was officially filed at 1:44 p. m.

According to the terms of the verdict, the judgment against the defendant includes interest from March 1, 1932, from the total amount of which \$30 is subtracted. The action was for breach of contract.
