Tax Statements Are Sent out

First Batch of County "Duns" Posted by Sheriff Deputy

First statements of 1941 property taxes due were posted Saturday to Marion county taxpayers by T. J. Brabec, chief deputy in charge of the tax collection department of Sheriff A. C. Burk's office.

The remainder of the statements will be mailed early next week, though the complete operation will probably take several days.

Brabec Saturday repeated a request which originated in his department earlier to the effect that taxpayers not appear to pay their levies until they have received the county's tax statement indicating the amount due.

Payment of taxes without presentation of statement will require extra bother both for taxpayer and the tax collection office, Brabec said, since the office is not equipped to verify payments at once unless it can check numbers appearing on the statements at the time payments are made.

Mailing of statements will be expedited by means of a postage meter machine, he indicated, which will stamp and seal statement envelopes in a fraction of the time necessary to perform the same operations by hand.

Handling of the envelopes by the post office will also be hastened, Brabec said.

Milk Hearing Set Monday

Salem aldermen, dairymen and other citizens, "just interested in the outcome," are looking forward to the public hearing on the proposed new city milk ordinance, which will be at 7:30 Monday night in the council chambers.

The hearing, authorized at last week's council session, will be conducted by members of the council health and sanitation committee. Speakers will include men from the state department of agriculture and the county health office.

Klamath Indians Plan School

KLAMATH FALLS, Feb. 22.—(AP)—The Klamath Indian council has approved expenditure of \$150,000 for a reservation school to provide training in forest fire control and aviation, Supt. B. G. Courtright said Saturday. Congressional approval would be needed before the money could be withdrawn from the tribe's fund, he said. Tribal leaders view the proposed school as a part of national defense, and want army supervision, Courtright said.
