US Senators Notify Independence of Approval

INDEPENDENCE—Mayor Dr. M. J. Butler received word last week from Senator Charles McNary and Senator Rufus Holman that the sewer project of WPA work has been approved.

Preliminary plans are being made by WPA Engineer Dann for Polk county, and work on the project is expected to start by March 17, which calls for relaying of the sewer on Main street and changing the sewer outlet from south to north of the city.

John Cunningham, engineer, employed by the city to provide plans and specifications, attended a special meeting of the council called Friday morning. Estimated cost to be \$18,000.
