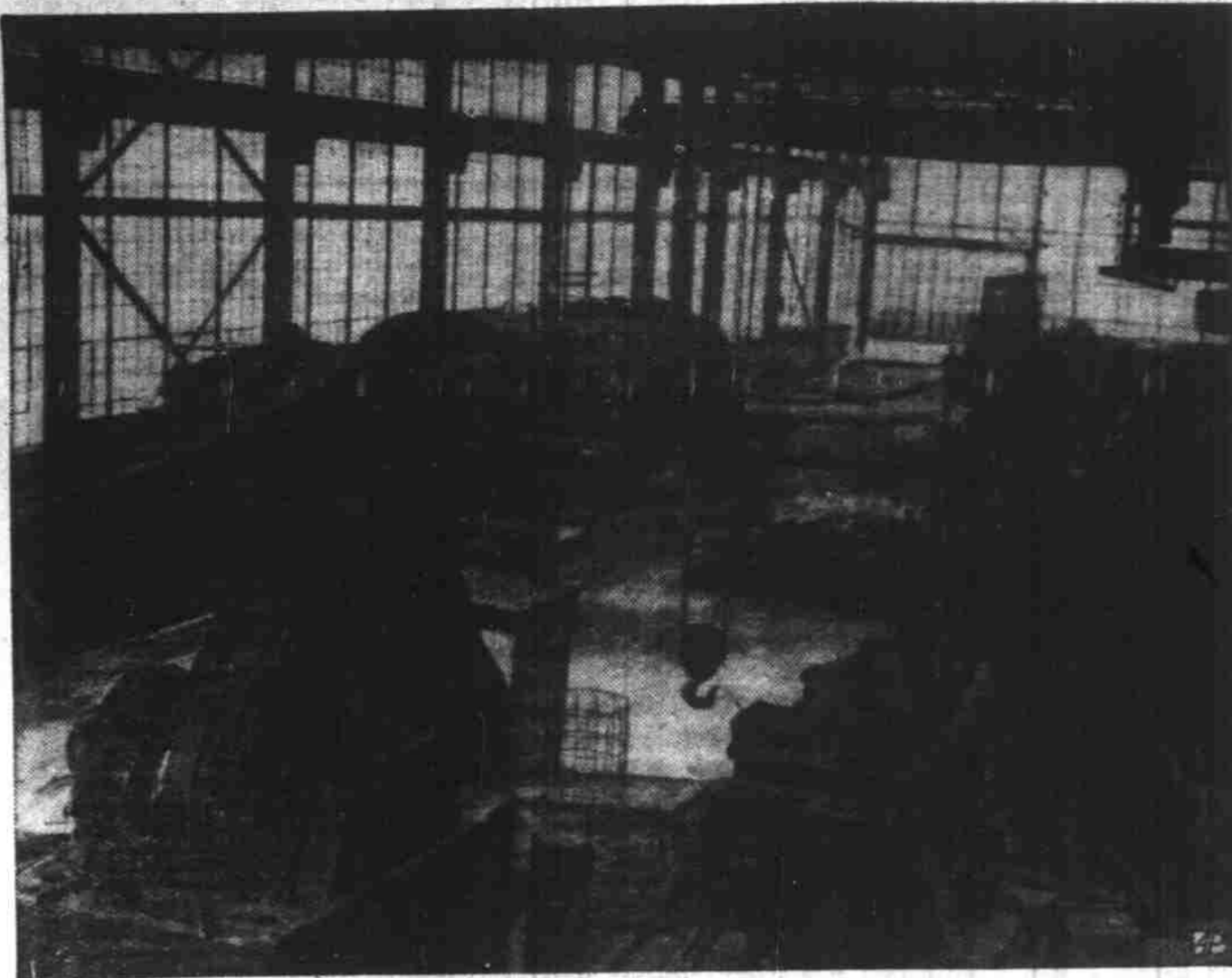
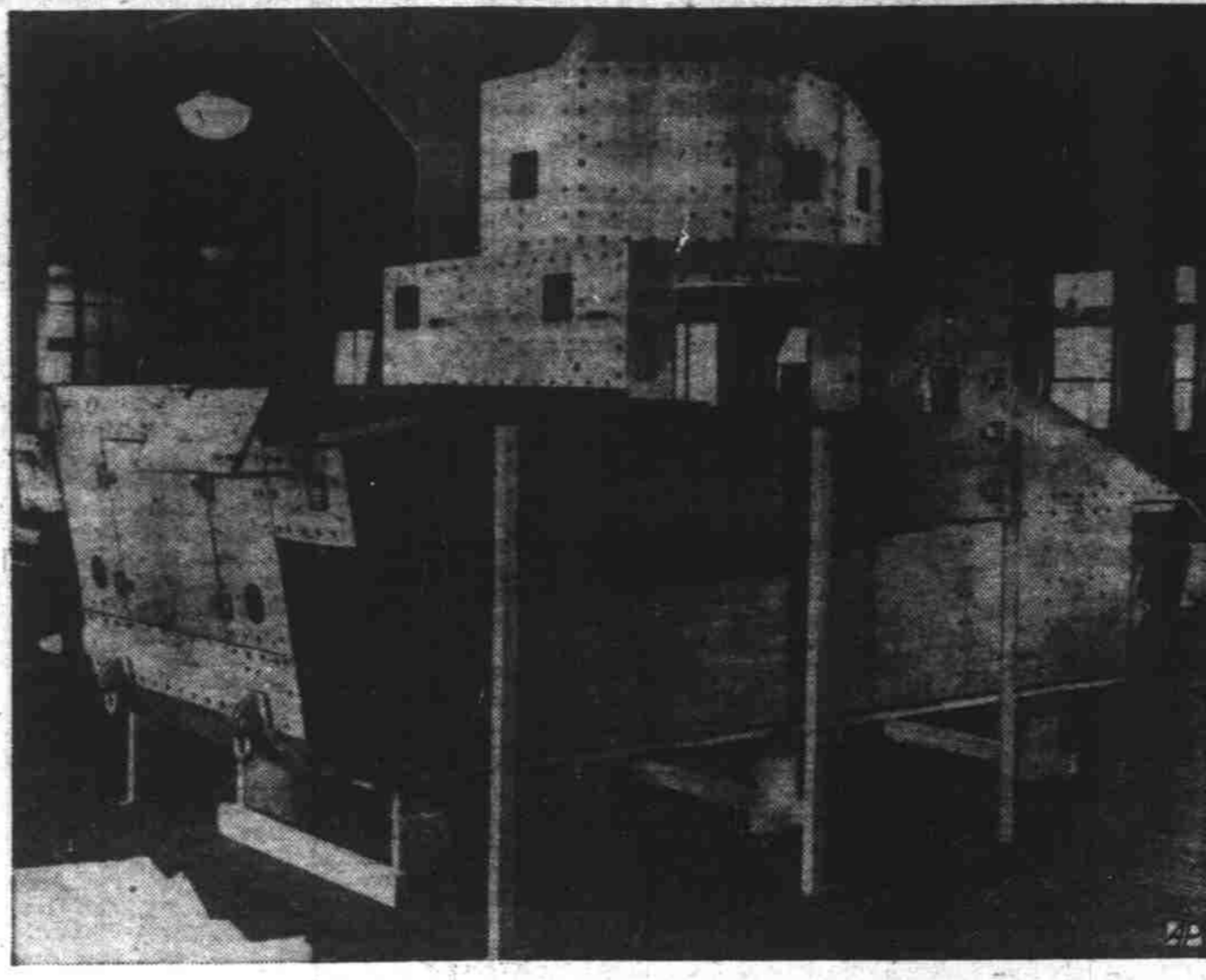

INSIDE CHRYSLER TANK PLANT—Heavy machinery necessary for mass production of army tanks crowds this section of the Chrysler army tank plant being built near Detroit. In the plant, which has a floor space of about 800,000 square feet, five 25-ton tanks will be rolling out daily by Aug. 1, according to present expectations. The tanks are for U.S. army use.

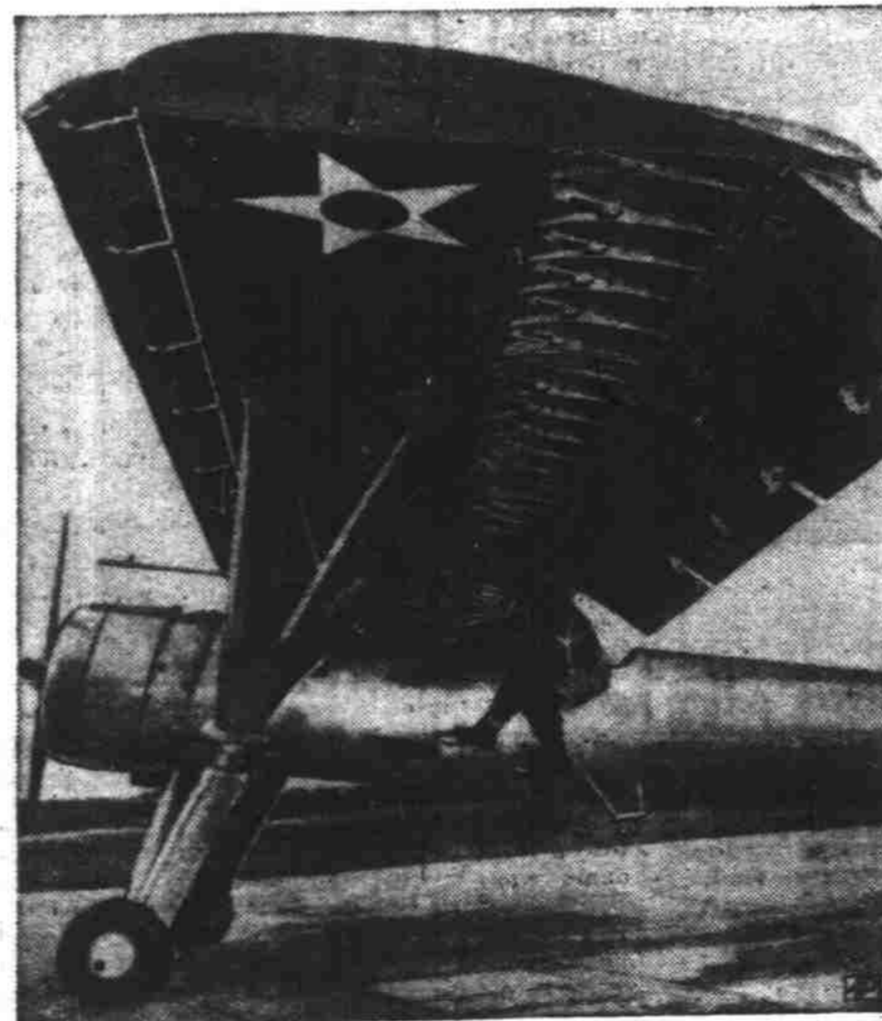
