### Methodists Sponsor Stayton Social

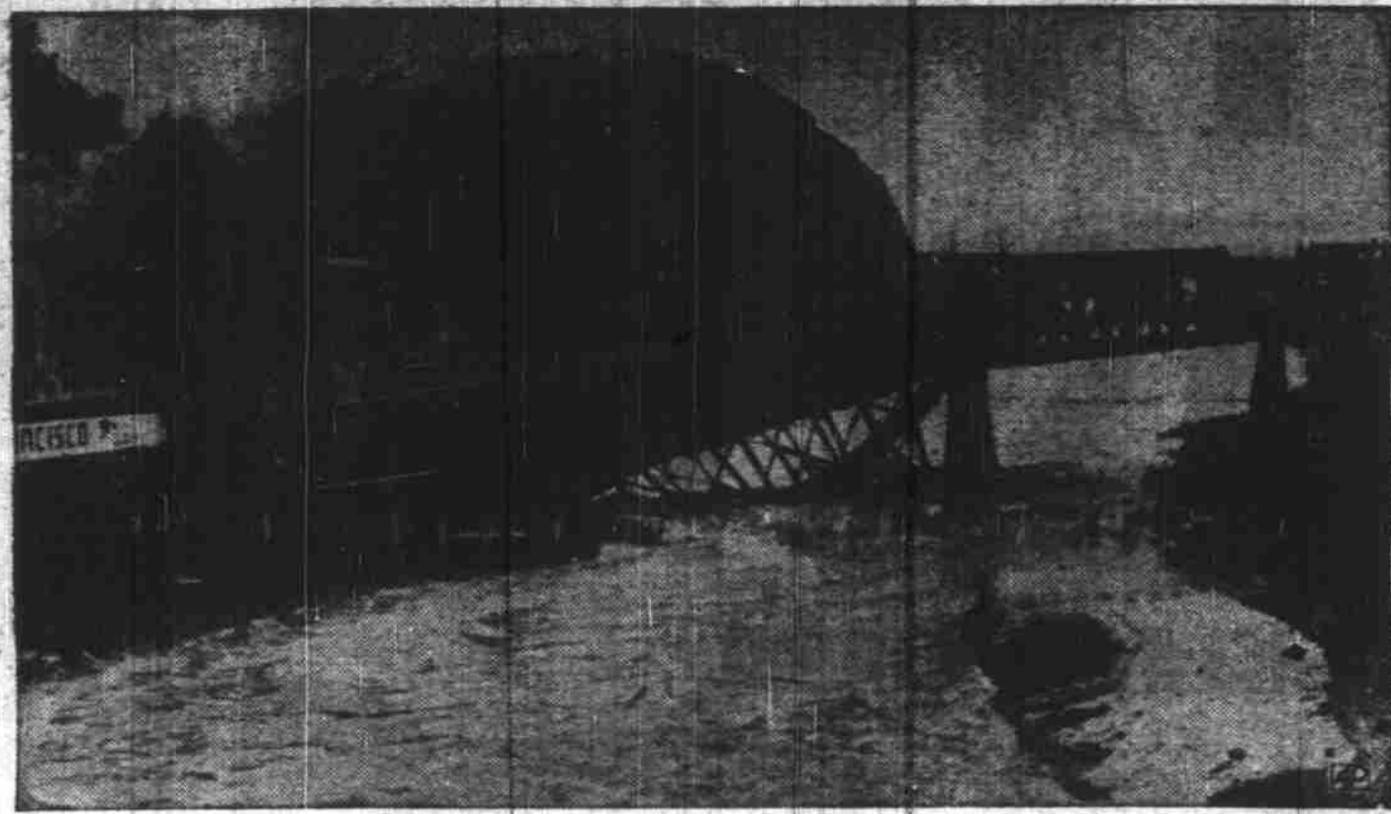
