CLATSkanie, March 6—(P)—Sylvester Manning, 63, Gervais, drowned in the river near here last night after his automobile plunged from the Columbia river highway.

A companion, Paul Jones, 73, Portland, was taken to a Portland hospital to be treated for shock and exposure.

GERVAIS—Sylvester D. Manning was born at St. Louis, Ore., November 14, 1878, and had been a resident of the Gervais community all of his life.

Rosary will be said tonight at 8:30 for Mr. Manning and funeral services conducted at 10 o'clock Saturday morning from the Sacred Heart Catholic church. Interment will be made in the Pioneer cemetery. Rigo funeral parlors of Woodburn are in charge of services.

Mrs. Manning preceded her husband in death by about three weeks.

Romney Breeders Sponsor Tour

The American Romney Breeders association is sponsoring a tour of Romney flocks in the vicinity of Salem, Corvallis and Newberg in conjunction of the visit of Prof. James Wilson of the University of California, who just concluded a seven-months' tour of Australia and New Zealand and selecting sheep for importation to the United States, it was learned today.

Sheepmen interested may hear Prof. Wilson at Corvallis Friday evening, in the Memorial Union building. On Saturday breeders will meet at the Oakmead farm at Newberg, owned by Clarence Bishop who recently purchased two Romney rams from New Zealand.

On Sunday a trip is being planned to Northrup Creek experimental station, Clatsop county, showing a logged off land development there and where the Romney sheep is well adapted to be raised.

Damages of \$20,000 Sought by Man Assertedly Hurt While Stacking Onion Crates

Plaintiff Asks Lump Sum and Monthly Payments of \$100 for Injuries; McKinney Case Continued

The \$20,000 damage action of Frank Wilson vs. Hayes and company will go on trial today in circuit court before Judge L. H. McMahan.

The plaintiff has asked recovery of the lump sum in addition to \$100 monthly from September, 1938, as damages for injuries allegedly suffered when he fell while stacking onion crates in the defendant's onion house.

In his complaint the plaintiff has specified that he suffered muscle and nerve injuries in his head, neck and shoulder, and that he has partially lost the use of his left arm, and that his left eye has also been injured. The fall occurred September 16, 1938.

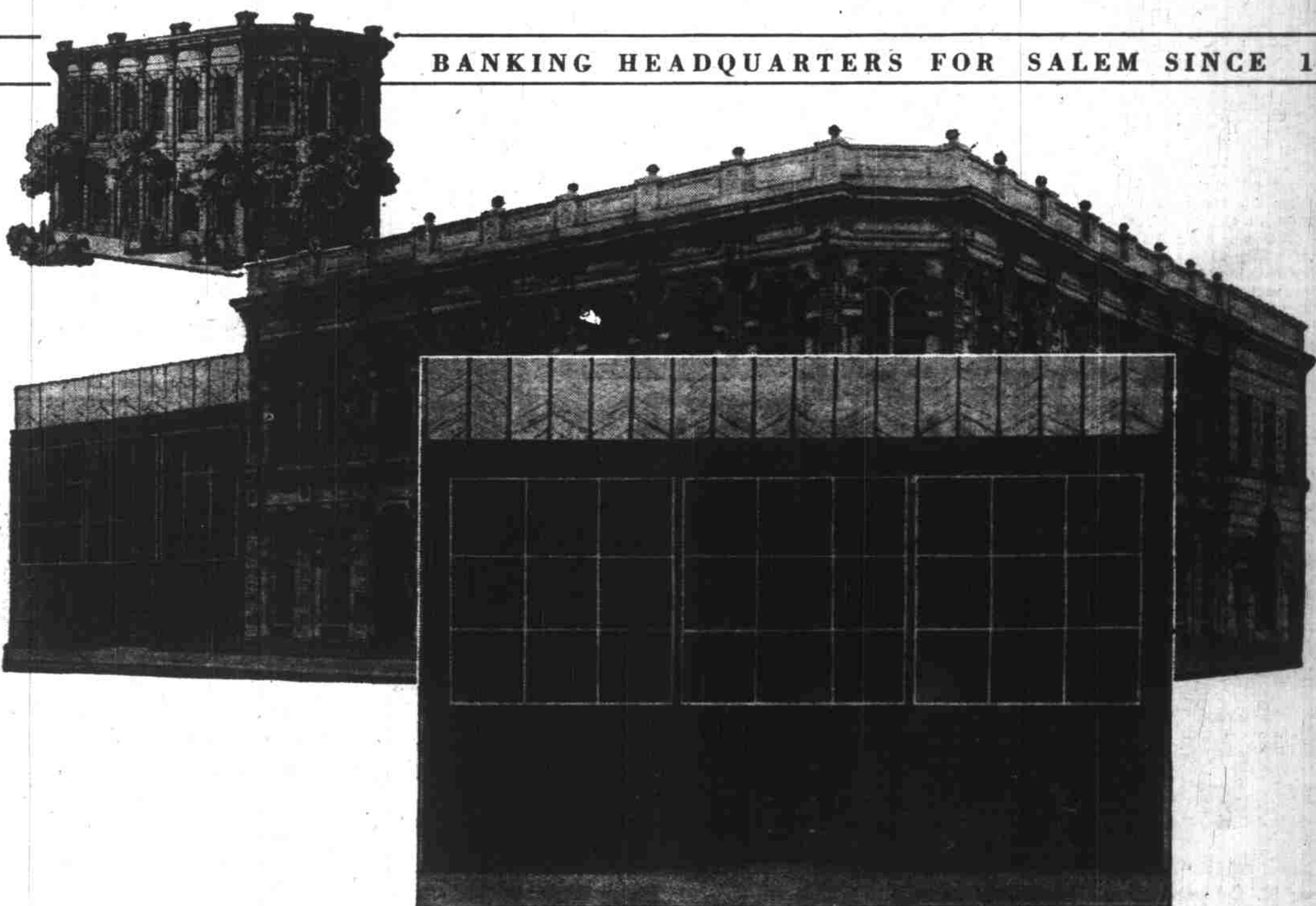
