Plaintiff Wins Suit to Gain Accident Compensation From State Industrial Board

Circuit Court Jury Agrees Herman Peetz Has Partial Disability of One Leg; Second of Similar Cases Today

A jury in the court of Circuit Judge L. H. McMahan Wednesday returned a judgment for the plaintiff in the accident compensation case of Herman Peetz vs. state industrial accident commission.

According to the terms of the verdict, the jury found that the plaintiff's injured condition had been aggravated since June 3, 1938, as the proximate result of an accident injury suffered on March 31, 1938, and that the plaintiff has sustained permanent partial disability as the proximate result of the injury of March, 1938, and later aggravation.

Extent of the plaintiff's partial disability was placed by the jury at 15 per cent of one leg. The court will begin hearing this matter on the case of G. S. Bunkowski against the accident commission, a matter which also results from a claim for damages previously rejected by the commission.

Salem Heights Sells \$17,000 Bond Issue

General obligation bonds amounting to \$17,000 were awarded to Fordyce & Company, Porter Building, Portland, with Charles N. Tripp, Salem associate, as lowest bidders by the Salem Heights water district Wednesday at 5:15 p.m. in the Salem Heights school house.

The bonds were sold at par on the basis of 3 per cent interest, redeemable at the rate of \$1000 per year. R. W. Skopel, Salem attorney, was legal adviser for the water district board.

Work on the new project will begin as soon as approval is forthcoming from Washington, DC for a WPA labor construction grant. Senator Charles McNary and Representative James Mott have both informed the local committee of E. A. Carleton, Jesse Campbell and Walter C. Bowman that action will soon be taken on the request.

Jobs Market In State Is On Upgrade

A decrease of nearly 18 per cent in February unemployment benefit payments and a drop of 25 per cent in the number of initial claims filed this year, are indications of the improvement in the job market during the past 12 months, state unemployment compensation officials announced Wednesday.

Checks sent out last month by the unemployment commission totaled \$421,442 as compared with \$511,766 for February, 1940. The first two months of 1940 saw 40,971 claims for jobless insurance filed, while this year the figure is 30,562.

The monthly report of the commission, as made by Administrator Silas Gaiser, shows \$11,034,000 in the trust fund, compared with \$11,053,473 at the end of January and \$8,664,898 a year ago. The active file of available workers shows an 18 per cent decrease. Reports from 23 employment offices operating under the commission, place the active file at 41,662 as compared with 50,685 a year ago.

Court Sets Pay For Surveyors; Impounds Fees

Court order setting a per diem rate of pay of \$4 for deputy surveyors and requiring Hugh Fisher, county surveyor, to pay in at once to the county treasury all fees collected by his office since January 6 was voted Wednesday by the Marion county court.

The order was the outcome of a dispute over compensation for deputies. Their retaining of fees collected was at variance with an opinion of the state attorney-general presented to the court by District Attorney Miller B. Hayden. Rate of pay for rodmen or chainmen is to be \$4 a day. They and the deputies will be paid only for the days they are actually employed.

County Judge Leroy Hewlett said that if the surveyor has no record of fees collected, "there is a grand jury in session, and it's time to find out why there is no record." He said he considered the situation a justifiable emergency to take the funds for the deputies from the emergency fund of the budget.

Deputies have previously retained fees for work done and have received from the county only use of offices and equipment.
