Name Green, It's Found In Market

Gone perhaps, is the day of hunting tender dandelion shoots in the backyard; the seeking out of young mustard to toss into the pot with the "side meat." No venturing into the meadow, armed with sharp knife and sharper eye, in quest of the piquant collard, the turnip top, to supply the eagerly-awaited "mess o' greens."

Hot houses have long since changed the greens habits of a nation. Though you never saw a stream, you may have watercress. Chicory, endive, romaine—once strangers to the average salad bowl—are now year 'round offerings at the green grocer's.

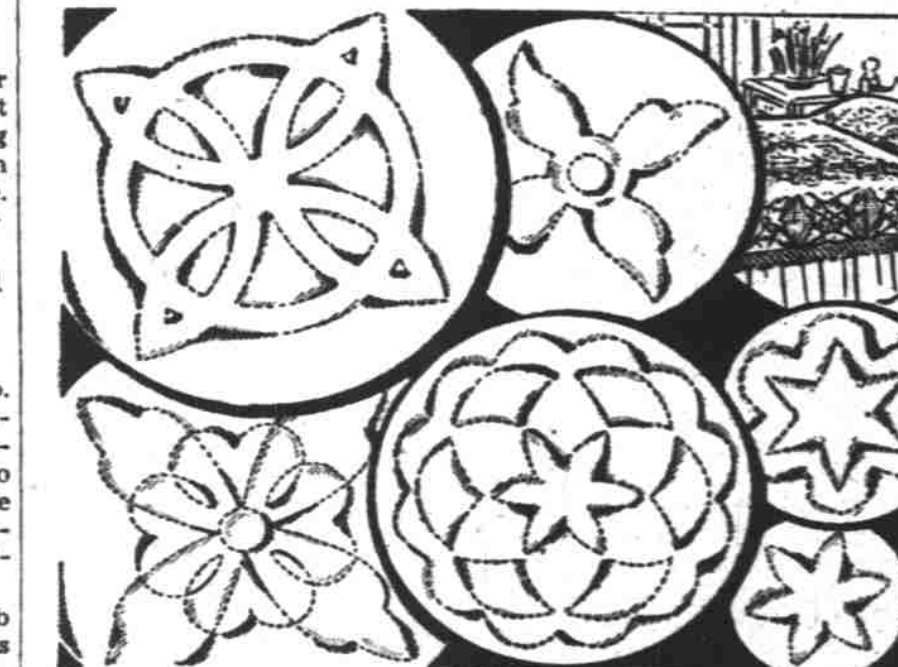
Let your table abound in greens, to celebrate spring's first hushed approach, to add crispness, vitamins, fun. Name it and you can have it, from tender young lettuce to cress to celery tops to escarole, to be mixed or matched, stewed or wilted, stuffed or shredded; to be garnish, vegetable, salad. Try your greens in ways like these:

WILTED LETTUCE
1 head garden lettuce
3 strips bacon
2 tablespoons sugar
Dash of pepper
1/4 cup vinegar
1/4 cup cooking oil
Separate lettuce leaves; wash well and dry. Tear large leaves into two or three pieces; place lettuce in salad bowl. Cut bacon into small pieces; cook slowly until done. Add sugar, pepper, vinegar and oil to bacon; heat to boiling point and pour over lettuce. Mix thoroughly and serve hot. Garnish with sliced hard-cooked eggs if desired. Serves 6 to 8.

BOILED GREENS
Remove roots, coarse stems and damaged leaves from greens (beet tops, dandelion greens, chard, kale, chicory). Wash carefully under cold running water, being sure all sand is removed. Young tender greens may be cooked in small amount of salted water; others should be covered with boiling salted water. Cook greens for 5 to 15 minutes, or longer, until tender but not over-cooked. Drain. Serve with:

CREAMY MUSTARD SAUCE
1/4 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 egg yolks
1 cup top milk, scalded
1/4 cup prepared mustard
2 tablespoons vinegar
Dash of tabasco
Add sugar and salt to egg yolks, beat thoroughly. Add to milk in top of double boiler. Blend mustard, vinegar and tabasco, and add slowly to milk mixture. Place over boiling water and cook until thick, stirring constantly. Yield: 1 1/2 cups sauce.

FORTUNATE MAN—Fortunate is the woman who has learned to cook and serve corned beef to the delight and appreciation of the man of the house. The do's are: Buy good-quality corned beef, then simmer—don't boil—until tender. This means 3 1/2 to 4 hours of slow cooking for a five-pound piece. For leftovers, try these rolls made of baking powder biscuit dough shaped like jelly roll. Bake in a hot oven about 20 minutes. Serve with cheese or mushroom sauce.
