The next to the last major bills dealing with liquor control, Rep. H. R. Jones' measure to legalize "on premise" consumption of light wines, came out of the senate committee on alcoholic traffic Thursday without recommendation. It is on the senate calendar for third reading today. The Burke fortified wine bill lies in the house alcoholic control committee.

The school tax equalization proposal is also on today's senate calendar as a result of a "do pass" report given it Thursday by the senate education committee.

Controversy twice waged already may arise again today on the senate bill for an investigation of voter registration in Multnomah county. Party lines marked a house vote Thursday afternoon, when 32 out of 37 republicans present rejected an adverse minority report, while the 21 democrats in attendance voiced a unanimous "aye."

Rep. Frank J. Loneragan's resolution for a constitutional amendment to put a limitation on property tax levies, a companion measure to his sales tax bill, which the house passed Thursday, is also on today's house calendar along with bills for vocational schools, free textbooks and the prima facie speed law. The speed bill was reported out of committee Thursday favorably, with its maximum designated speed amended back to 55 miles per hour, the senate figure.

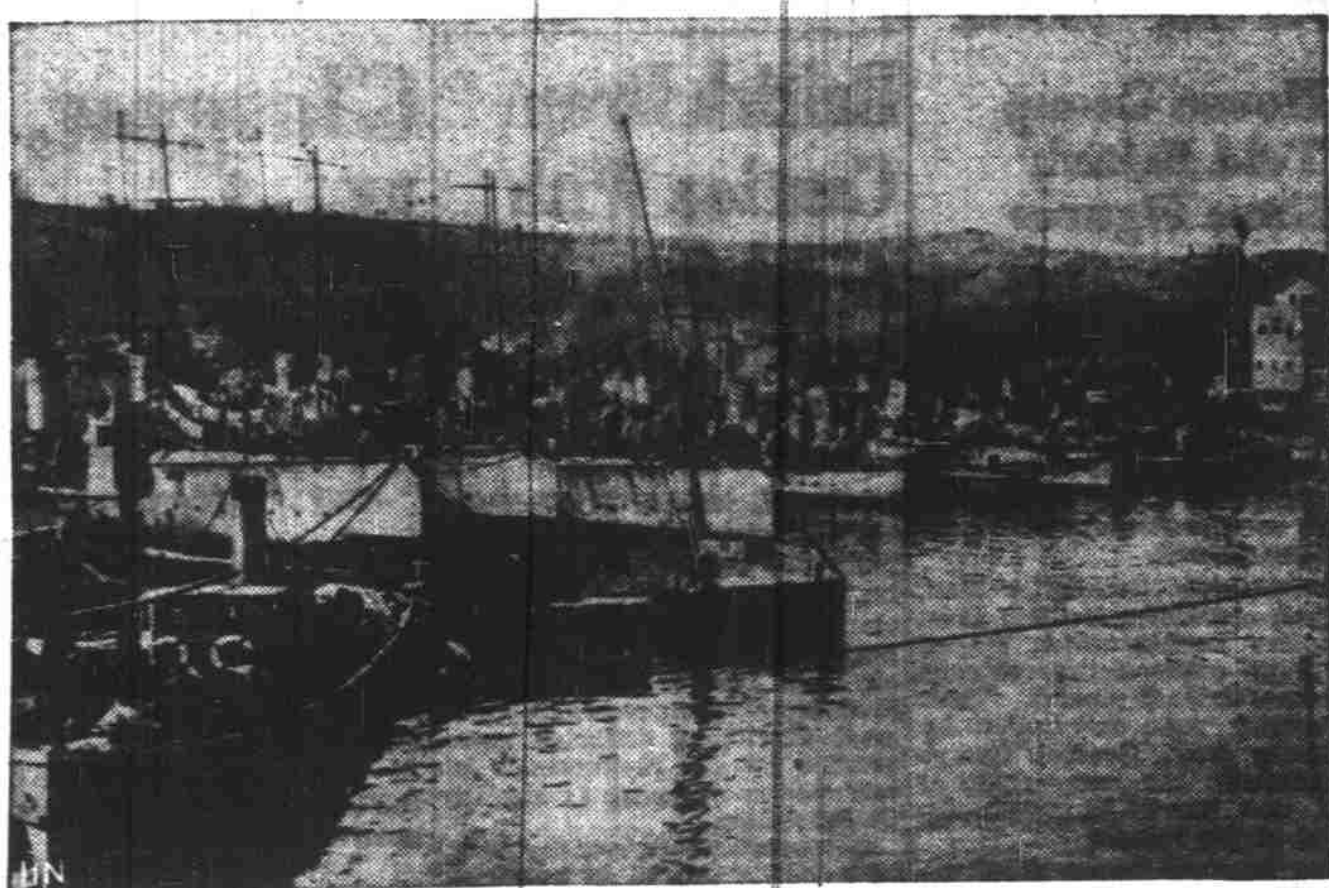

British Drop Air Caution

RAF Stages Greatest Offensive on Nazi Bases and Cities

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bombers—their name and make of origin not disclosed by the air ministry—went into action with the heaviest explosives in the British arsenal.

Berlin, the ministry said, was left alight with tremendous fires; so too, were the main German ports of Hamburg and Bremen.

A Norwegian airbase was bombed, the ministry's account said, along with others in The Netherlands and with various targets in northwest Germany and the low countries generally.

The attack on Berlin was the first since Dec. 20, and it was intimated that there would be no more long immunity for Hitler's capital.

The most significant point of this defense, as the British put it, was that perhaps 200 Nazi planes were over Britain during the night and thus the proportion of those destroyed was about one in 20 as contrasted with the one in 30 which had resulted from the best defense previously offered.

When the ratio falls to one in 10, informed sources said, the menace of the night bomber may be said to have been defeated.

For both the offense and the defense in the aerial war the

Turkish disclosed new plans.

Offensively, the American-made consolidated and four-motored Boeing bombers are prominent in the picture for they are expected to widen the British attacking area and thus force the Nazis to thin out their anti-aircraft defenses.

Defensively, new weapons—nature not disclosed—have been given to night fighter planes and a "shotgun" type of barrage, throwing a complete pattern of shell in heavy and coordinated fire, is being operated.

Assured of replacements from the United States, the air ministry also is prepared to augment greatly its night fighter patrols. These patrols got five of the German planes shot down Thursday night.

Nazis Smash British Ports

Glasgow, Liverpool Harbors Take Brunt of Bomber Raids

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British assaults with a report of 16 deaths and 37 injured persons in Berlin, three deaths and three injured in Bremen—and only minor property damage at all three places.

Britain said that while the intensity of the raid on Liverpool was comparable to the big raids on England last fall, the results nowhere were the same.

The Germans were paying dearly for their attacks on England, the British indicated.

British sources declared 17 German raiders, most of them expensive bombers, were shot down since Wednesday night. One British defensive plane was acknowledged lost.

The Germans Thursday said the British lost 13 planes and the Germans six.

British bombers carried on attacks in the Mediterranean also, raiding airbases on the Italian island of Rhodes and causing fires visible 20 miles away.

The surge of British and German aerial battling practically threw into the background the German move to swing reluctant Yugoslavia into the axis lineup.

German quarters indicated the fuhrer is growing impatient at Yugoslavia's delay.

Turkey Reports Nazis Massing On Frontiers

In Ankara, Turkey, the Turkish radio said it had received reports that both Germany and Italy were massing troops on their Yugoslav frontiers.

The Greek high command said fresh Italian infantrymen were thrown into the Albanian assault Thursday on a wide front but their thrusts were futile and losses heavy.

The Greek marine ministry also said the Greek destroyer Psara on convoy duty in the Aegean sea sank an enemy submarine which attacked the convoy.

Britain and Germany were active at sea, too.

The British said an aerial torpedo scored a direct hit on the stern of a German destroyer off Jutland.

The German high command said a speedboat had sunk a British destroyer off the English southeast coast.

The British acknowledged the loss of the Manistee, 5,360-ton auxiliary vessel.

The British middle east command in Cairo reported its forces in Italian Somaliland were advancing "in all sectors."

Pressure on the oldest Italian colony, Eritrea, was increased by the British navy's announcement that the small Strait of Babel Mander, at the southern end of the Red sea, had been closed to bottle up any Italian ships remaining in Eritrea.

results of operations on victims of infantile paralysis in which active muscles were switched over and stitched to inactive muscles to enable the patients to walk again.

"I thought if the orthopedic surgeons can do that in the feet, maybe I might be able to do it in the neck for paralysis of the vocal cords," he explained, because paralysis of the nerves which control the muscles is the same in any part of the body."

Most of the muscles work in opposition to each other and in paralysis the active muscles pull the inactive muscles a part like the stretch of rubber band. In the case of paralysis of the larynx the vocal cords are pulled apart. Dr. King's operation consists of tying the active throat muscles together to bring the cords into alignment again. All but two of the patients operated on were women.

Formal Sewer Fund Notice Given City

Formal notice that Governor Charles A. Sprague has signed house bill 517, appropriating \$75,000 to provide better sewer facilities for the state institutions, was received Thursday afternoon by Mayor W. W. Chadwick. The ordinance calling a special city election for the bond issue for \$200,000 in the local project will come up for first and second readings at the council meeting Monday night.

The letter, from Daniel J. Fry, secretary of the board of control, said the board is "now in position to enter into a contract with the city of Salem in relation to the matter which the bill concerns."

A \$233,842 works progress administration allocation toward the project has already been approved by President Roosevelt. The total estimated cost is \$458,765 for the system, which will include an interceptor line and a sewage disposal plant.

The state appropriation of \$75,000 would be expended for installation of pipe to various institutions and for decreasing the city's share of the cost. It is believed that the tuberculosis hospital, penitentiary annex, Fairview home and girls' industrial school will be added to the system, which now serves the state hospital and the penitentiary.

Seek Way to Appease Germans Without Joining Axis

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count on non-axis friendship, and access to that 100-odd mile gateway is the principal objective of German pressure.

Greece, which has declared she will continue her fight against the axis regardless of Yugoslavia's decision, busily fortified Thrace against attack of a German army on her Bulgarian frontier and continued to move civilians out of the line of march.

Turkey still watched the situation calmly, but with warlike preparations. Officially inspired newspapers counseled the public to be calm, and assured the nation that defenses were "adequate" for any contingency.

In Greek quarters in Belgrade there were reports that Berlin was growing impatient for Yugoslav-ia's decision and might demand a quick reply to the "invitation to join the axis."

Yugoslavs still carry over from World war days a hatred of the Germans and, conversely, affection for Britain and France, who helped at Versailles to amalgamate with the Serbs the numerous minor and antagonistic races which form this largest Balkan nation.

Leaders of the nation's army of a million still talk some of the possibility of military resistance, but political leaders in answer point to the map showing five axis countries ringing Yugoslavia.

"Fight or die," advocates insist, however, that the army might carry on guerrilla warfare from the Serbian mountains, where blitzkrieg tactics would be of little value.
