

US Treasury Plans Drive for Cash From Children, Bankers And Plain Man-on-the-Street

New Securities Range From 10-Cents to \$10,000; Campaign Rivaling Liberty Loans Contemplated

WASHINGTON, March 20—(AP)—Secretary Morgenthau announced Thursday that four new types of treasury securities, ranging in denomination from 10 cents to \$10,000, would be sold to children, the man-in-the-street and bankers to finance a large part of the defense program.

Some officials have indicated hopes of selling between \$3,000,000,000 and \$4,500,000,000 worth of them in the first 14 months after the official opening of the sales campaign on May 1. Morgenthau, however, declined to say what his goal was.

Since the treasury probably will have to borrow more than \$10,000,000,000 in the next year, however, the treasury will supplement these sales with regular subscription sales of the usual treasury securities.

Morgenthau hopes the securities announced Thursday will be bought by the general public in a savings campaign. Some economists believe such a campaign may ward off inflation by inducing people to save instead of spending to the limit and thus bidding up prices.

To stimulate sales, the treasury is planning a campaign rivaling the Liberty bond drives of World war days.

On the opening day, May 1, about 16,000 postoffices and the federal reserve banks and branches will have the new securities for sale. More postoffices, thousands of commercial banks, and possibly department stores may be enlisted later as sales places.

President Roosevelt has promised to make the first purchase, and Mrs. Roosevelt the second. Briefly, the new securities follow:

Postal savings stamps—In denominations of 10, 25 and 50 cents, and \$1 and \$5.

Defense saving bonds—Almost identical with existing "baby" bonds, in denominations of \$25, \$50, \$100, \$500 and \$1000.

Series F savings bonds—Similar to baby bonds except that denominations are \$100, \$500, \$1000, \$5000 and \$10,000.

Series G savings bonds—Same denominations as series F, but sold at face value and bear 2 1/4 per cent interest.

Swallows Return To Capistrano

Great Wheat Surplus Seen

PULLMAN, Wash., March 20—(AP)—The wheat surplus in North America will exceed a billion bushels by the end of the 1941 harvest, N. E. Dodd, director of the western division of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration, predicted Thursday.

"Maybe we'll have to pile it on the ground like I saw them do in Canada last fall," he said, adding: "Frankly, I don't know the answer."

Dodd, here to confer with farm leaders and Department of Agriculture representatives, said only an unprecedented crop failure could hold the United States surplus below "half a billion bushels above domestic requirements and possible exports."

"Add another half billion bushels or more in Canada and a substantial amount in Argentina and it's easy to see the wheat grower has plenty to worry about," he said.

"If any food is shipped to Britain it will probably be in the form of meats, fats, dried fruits, vegetables and milk, and other concentrated foodstuffs." The possibility that wheat might go to England under terms of the lease-lend bill he branded as "wishful thinking."

He said there seemed to be no doubt producers would be asked to vote in a national marketing quota referendum May 31.

Before the referendum is held, however, he said some amendments probably would be adopted in the laws governing marketing quotas. He said proposed changes included an increase in the penalty for marketing excess wheat, making quotas effective for two-year periods and making them effective only on farms cultivating more than 15 acres of wheat.
