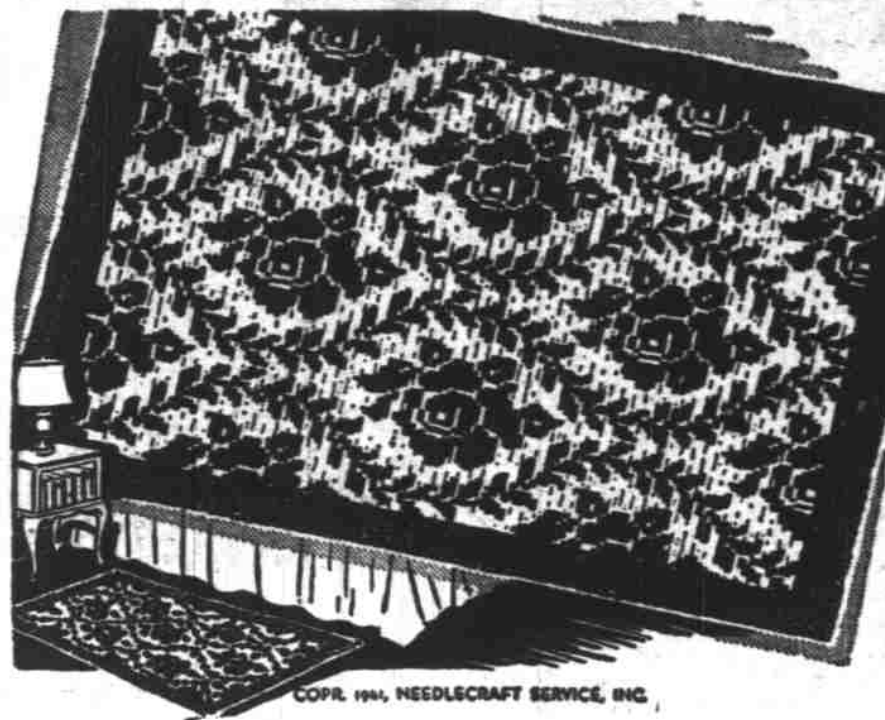
Dallas Couples Give Dinner

Easter's Season for Hot Cross Buns

Easter, the season of new spring hats and suits, is also the season when many clever cooks are fashioning plump Hot Cross Buns for their families. Light, elastic dough is molded into buns and placed on greased baking sheets, and then each roll is cut with scissors or knife in preparation for the frosting cross after baking.

1/4 cup lukewarm water, 1 cup milk, 1/4 cup shortening, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 eggs, beaten, 6 cups sifted flour, about. Soften yeast in lukewarm water. Scald milk. Add shortening, sugar and salt. Cool to lukewarm. Add flour to make a thick batter. Add yeast and eggs. Beat well. Add enough more flour to make a soft dough.

Carrots Best of Home Crops

Discovery of vitamins and the especial richness of carrots in vitamin A sent the consumption of carrots skyrocketing in this country. Yet of the millions who consume them dutifully, relatively few are aware that carrots are one of the most delicious foods that ever delighted the palate of a gourmet.

The reason is that the carrot of our markets, usually full grown, and a long time from picking, have lost most of the flavor and much of the tenderness which they possessed when young. If you would know the carrot, pull them in your garden when they are about as large as a lead pencil, cook them and serve with melted butter, and then watch the faces of your guests! This is something they never knew before!

They are among the hardy seeds which can be sown as soon as the ground can be prepared, regardless of the frost date. The seeds germinate slowly, and are usually mixed with a few radish seeds, which come up quickly and mark the row, and can be harvested before the carrots make much growth.

Carrots do not suffer as much from crowding as most root crops. Instead of thinning out when they are tiny, they can be allowed to grow unthinned, until the roots are of pencil size, and at their most delicious stage of tenderness and flavor. From this stage until they are about half grown, carrots are at their best, and the best way to manage is to make small and frequent plantings, so that new crops are coming on throughout the season, and all your carrots are enjoyed at the height of quality.

Today's Menu

- Salmon ring with an extra bit of "oomph" is on the day's menu. Celery root salad, Salmon ring, Scalloped potatoes, Mustard greens, Grapefruit, orange and coconut White cake. FESTIVE SALMON RING: 1 No. 2 can salmon, 4 egg yolks, beaten, 1/4 cup melted butter, 1/2 cup cracker meal, 1/2 teaspoon salt, Dash of pepper, 1 teaspoon minced onion, 4 stiffly beaten egg whites. Combine all ingredients, folding

in the egg whites last. Pour into a well-greased ring mold. Set the mold in a pan of hot water and bake for 40 minutes in a moderate oven (350°). Serve with the center filled with creamed peas. This is equally delicious served cold with combination vegetable salad as the center of attraction. Serves 6.

SCALLOPED MUSHROOMS AND CELERY

Wash large whole mushrooms in salted water, slice thin and for each cup of mushrooms use 1 cup finely cut, but not ground tender celery. Melt 4 tablespoons butter in a skillet, add mushrooms and celery and stir over the fire until the juice starts. Butter a baking dish, sprinkle with toasted breadcrumbs or cracker meal, put in celery and mushroom mixture including juice, cover with fine breadcrumbs, dot with butter and bake about 20 minutes. Just long enough to heat through and brown delicately. Serve as a main dish.
