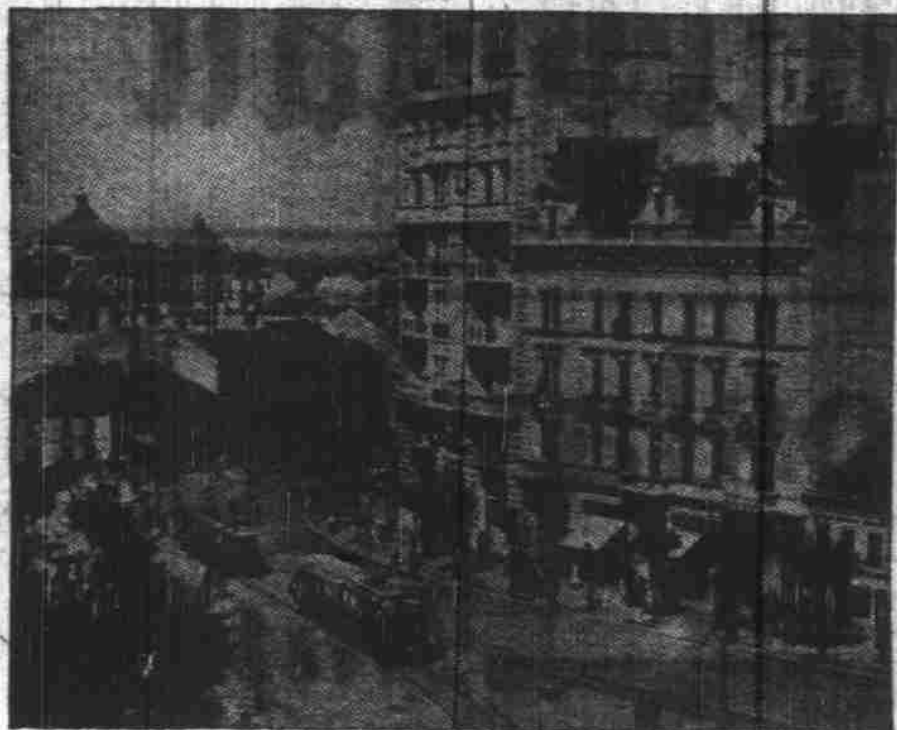

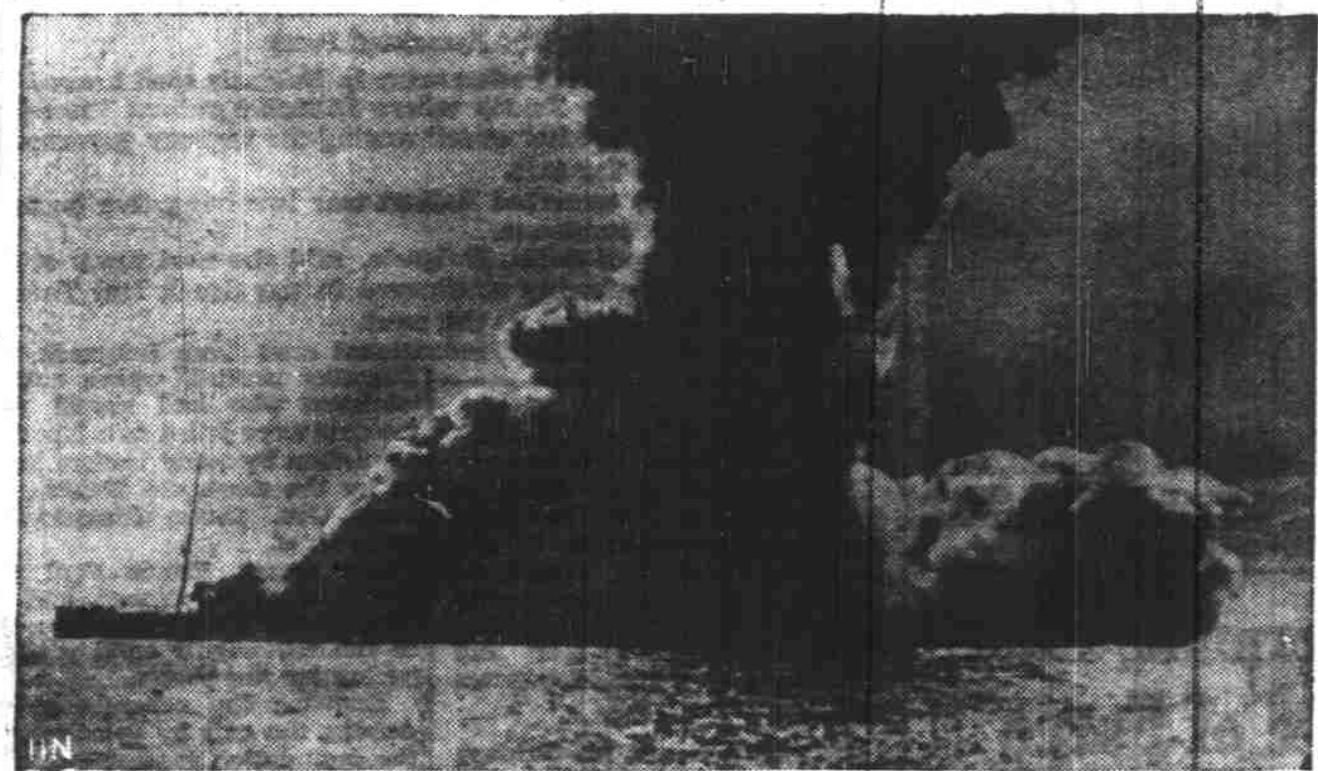

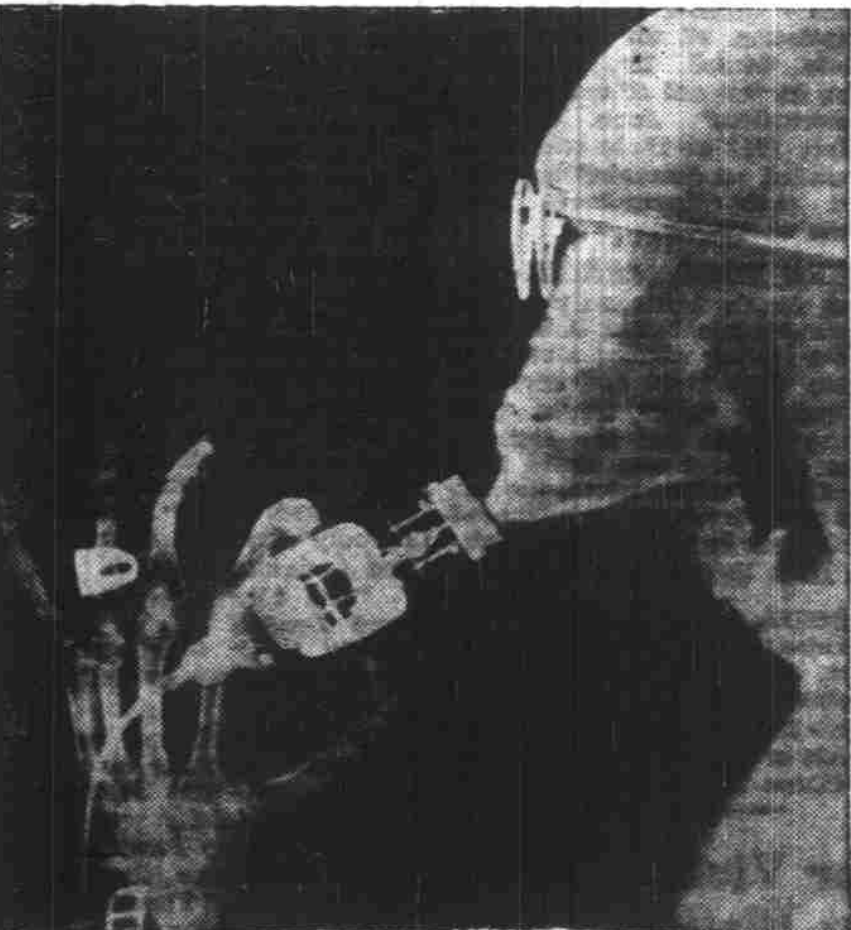

Standard Oil Tanker Burns After Torpedoing



A huge column of smoke already rising from fire started by the first torpedo, a second torpedo strikes the Standard Oil tanker, Charles Pratt, above, which was sunk by a submarine off the west coast of Africa, Dec. 21. This dramatic picture was taken by P. S. Schafin, assistant engineer of the vessel, as he and other members of the crew pulled away from the doomed ship in lifeboats. The rescued crew has just arrived in Bayonne, N. J., aboard another Standard Oil tanker. They spent seven days and nights in open lifeboats before they were rescued. The crew was American, but the ship was operating under Panamanian registry.

Pray Dismisses Capt. Goddard

An informed source in this capital said the new southward movement of troops, under way since the occupation of Bulgaria, had been reversed suddenly and a rush of anti-reinforcement was sent in the direction of defiant Yugoslavia.

WINDSOR, Ont., March 27—(P)—Cheers of "Long Live King George VI and King Peter II" were heard here Thursday as 1,200 local Yugoslavs celebrated the overthrow of the Yugoslav regency government which had signed a pact with the axis.

Agricultural Aid Approved

Strong "Farm Bloc" Shows Power in Appropriations

\$150,000,000 for additional payments on this year's crops. In all, more than \$950,000,000 of the funds in the senate measure would go to farmers complying with administration farm programs.

The house had authorized \$212,000,000 for parity payments intended to increase purchasing power of cotton, wheat, corn, tobacco and rice growers who comply with the present farm program.

However, it authorized these payments for 1942 crops and provided \$50,000,000 cash. The agricultural department would be authorized to contract to pay out the balance of \$182,000,000.

The senate group voted to provide \$450,000,000 cash. It directed that \$150,000,000 of \$450,000,000 be applied to 1941 crops for which congress already has voted \$212,000 parity payments in addition to \$500,000 of "soil conservation" payments.

"Even with this increase this year farmers probably will average less than 80 per cent of parity," Senator Russell said. "Farmers are entitled to more but this is about as far as we thought we could go."

Second largest increase was \$35,000,000 for financing the "stamp plan" for disposal of surplus farm products to needy persons. The house had voted \$100,000,000 for this plan in addition to \$100,000,000 diverted from customs receipts. The senate group would make \$235,000,000 available in the next fiscal year.

The senate group also added more than \$7,000,000 to funds for the farm security administration, which carries out the rural relief program, and \$25,000,000 to its loaning power. This brought their totals to \$66,147,845 of direct appropriations and \$125,000,000 of loan authority.

Another \$4,000,000 was added to the \$9,000,000 for forest roads and trails.

WASHINGTON, March 27—(P)—The senate appropriations subcommittee is considering increasing to \$500,000 the 1942 appropriation for the Sherman branch agriculture experiment station at Moro,

Yugos Defiant Of Nazi Wrath

Overthrow Regency in Coup; German Army Expected to Invade

with the British aid already in Greece, the three nations could present a phalanx of 2,200,000 tough troops against the axis.

Yugoslavia is almost ringed with axis troops—Italians in Albania to the west, and German troops in Austria, Hungary and Rumania to the north, and Bulgaria to the east. The southern part of the country affords natural mountainous defenses.

Prime Minister Churchill of Britain promised the resisting nation aid. He said:

"The British empire and its allies will make common cause with the Yugoslav nation and we will continue to march and strive together until complete victory is won."

Fulfillment of at least part of the second condition—that King Peter ask for help and that the Germans make a hostile move at Yugoslavia—seemed very near.

Diplomats in the southeast said that German troops were almost certain to march into Yugoslavia at the moment that Peter's government formally signaled what already had been strongly intimated—a repudiation of the axis pact which had been reluctantly signed only last Tuesday.

An Italian commentator observed that England was playing a "most violent card," and the belief was expressed in Rome that German troops would go into Yugoslavia.

The United States sent a message to Peter's associates saying that the ouster of the pro-axis regime was a matter of self congratulation to every liberty-loving man and woman and that President Roosevelt had power under the lease-lend act to give effective material assistance to nations seeking to preserve their independence against aggression.

Tying in closely with this great change of atmosphere in the Balkans were British announcements that General Sir Archibald P. Wavell's imperial armies of Africa had taken Cheren in Italian Eritrea and Harar in Italian Ethiopia.

Cheren, long and savagely defended by some 35,000 fascists, commands the approach to Asmara, the Eritrean capital; Harar lies but 25 miles from the railway connecting the Ethiopian capital of Addis Ababa with Jibuti.

These two victories could be extended quickly to the point where the British would be enabled to claim the substantial destruction of all of Mussolini's African empire and the liquidation of the African campaign, and to send many more of the ablest imperial troops to Greece and to Yugoslavia if need be.

On the western front the day was quiet. Two British coastal towns were bombed—one in the southeast and the other in the south—and houses and other buildings were damaged.

Army Auditors Go Mechanical

WASHINGTON, March 27—(P)—Mechanization, long familiar to troops in the field, finally has come to the army's finance officers.

The war department said recently that officers at 31 posts had been equipped with mechanical check signers, shortening the task of affixing the officers' signatures.

The 31 posts send out at least 10,000 checks a month.

Mishap Victim Dies

PORTLAND, Ore., March 28—(P)—Mrs. Bessie Schlitz, 73, Portland, died Thursday night of injuries suffered in an automobile accident near Aurora yesterday. She was a passenger in a car that left the highway and smashed into an abandoned service station.

Senator Holman (R-Ore) learned today.

The station received no funds for the current year, but the house bill allocated \$1500 for it for 1942.

Female Gorilla Gets "Passport" for US

TAMPA, Fla., March 27—(P)—Toto, the female gorilla, is free to go out with the circus this spring and Ogle Gargantua, her intended mate, to her heart's content.

Toto was held in technical custody of the US government, pending settlement of a customs lien on her importation from Cuba.

Everybody got together Thursday and agreed that \$10,412.50 was a fair value for Toto for customs purposes.
