Wrongful Plumbing Installation And Drainage at Silverton Results in Fine, Parole

Probation Granted on Condition That Work Be Corrected; Charge of Conducting Business Sans License Dropped

Erwin Smith was fined \$10 and \$4.50 costs, the fine later being suspended, Thursday in Salem justice court on a charge of installing plumbing and drainage in a Silverton building in a manner contrary to provisions of the state plumbing code.

He was released on six months' probation after payment of costs on condition that plumbing installed be corrected. Private prosecutor was Arthur J. Ferrell, Portland, state plumbing inspector.

Two Oregon men, one 59 years of age and the other 84, have requested permission to enlist as volunteers in the United States armed forces, Lieutenant Colonel Elmer V. Wooten, state selective service director, announced here Thursday.

Doctor Williams, oldest of the two men, lives at Sandy, Clackamas county. He told selective service officials that he would not require much equipment for the reason that he owns two trusted rifles and a quantity of ammunition. Williams said he could account for an enemy at each shot.

Otto Lantinen, Mulino, also in Clackamas county, said he had served several hitches in the United States coast artillery. He requested special consideration because of this service.

Both men applied to Clackamas county selective service board No. 1 for enlistment. Williams recently observed his 84th birthday anniversary.

Present limitations prevent acceptance of men over 36 years of age.

New Selectees Move in April

Movement of 207 men included in the fifth call under the selective service regulations in Oregon, will start April 7, military headquarters announced here Thursday.

This call will bring the total number of Oregon men to 2150 or 76 per cent of the 2806 men included in the state's quota for the year ending June 30. Approximately 200 men required for replacements will be drawn next week.

Men included in the fifth call will report to the induction station in the Portland armory and later will be sent to military camps.

Schedule of the arrival of the men in Portland follows: April 7—Yamhill county board, 5; Marion board No. 1, 5; Polk county board, 4; Benton board, 4; Linn board No. 8, 7. April 10—Marion county board No. 2, 4; Marion board No. 3, 3.
