Two Men Missing—Police were on the lookout Monday for two Salem men, one of whom, Al Harris, 68, has been missing since March 24. The other, Ross Wood, 59, was last seen at Dayton March 29. Concern was felt for Wood after West Salem Patrolman Wayne Parker found his car parked in West Salem with the keys on the seat. He reported finding the car to Mrs. Wood, 3915 State, and she told him that her husband had been gone since Saturday. When last seen Wood was wearing a grey suit and hat. Harris, a door-to-door salesman, was reported missing from his lodgings by Mrs. Pauline Fletcher, 960 Broadway street. He was wearing a grey suit and hat and carrying two black sample cases when he left last Monday, saying he was going to make a call in south Salem.

Pipeline Approved—The Marion county court Monday agreed with the Salem water commission as to the installation of an eight-inch pipe and a fire hydrant across the Silverton road to the county shops located at the edge of Salem. The line will also furnish water and fire protection to A. C. Haag and Lee U. Eyerly for new buildings close to the shops. The county will advance \$1500 for the improvement, and will pay \$7.50 monthly regularly for fire hydrant use and going rates for water. In return the water commission will establish a \$1500 credit in favor of the county.

Annual County "Play Day" Set For Fairgrounds on May 2

The annual Marion county school "Play day" will be held at the state fairgrounds on Friday, May 2, according to plans of the committee in charge, Mrs. Agnes C. Booth, county school superintendent announced Monday.

For the event, school children from virtually all of Marion county's 106 districts will assemble for athletic events, an open-air lunch and brief exercises.

Chief event of the day will be the annual track meet, in which children from all grades up to the eighth will participate.

Events for boys in grades four to six, inclusive, will include 50 and 75 yard dashes, a three legged race, gunny sack race, running broadjump and 200 yard relay. For girls in fourth to sixth grades, events will be a 25-yard dash, 50 yard dash, three legged race, baseball throw, potato race and 100 yard relay.

For grades seven and eight will be, for boys, 50 and 75 yard dash; three legged race, potato race and 200 yard relay race.

Committee in charge of the Play Day arrangements comprises Nels O. Anderson, chairman, and Ralph Nelson and Jean L. Graham.

Santiam River Hearings Set

Taking of testimony concerning Mill and North Santiam river creek water right disputes in Marion county will be resumed before State Engineer Charles E. Stricklin on May 22, the engineer announced Monday. Several contested rights remain on his docket.

Stricklin said it would require at least a year's time for the final findings to be prepared by his office after the hearings are closed.

Testimony recently given on Mill creek claims related back to the origin of the stream in the late 1850s while Oregon was still a United States territory.

Suit Filed in Circuit Court Asks \$20,250 for Asserted Loss of Good Name and Credit

Complaint Alleges Defendant Caused Arrest of Plaintiff on Charges Dismissed by County Grand Jury

A complaint for \$10,000 for alleged loss of reputation and credit, \$10,000 punitive damages and for \$250 previously spent on counsel's fees was filed Monday in circuit court here by Durward Helyer against G. E. Prime.

The complaint alleged that Prime on October 2, 1940, "maliciously intending to injure the plaintiff in his good name and credit," appeared before Miller B. Hayden, then justice of the peace, and complained on oath against Helyer, charging him with assault and battery "maliciously and without probable cause."

Helyer stated he was forced to make \$500 bail after appearing in justice court, and that on October 3 he pleaded not guilty to the charge, waived preliminary hearing in justice court, and was bound over to the Marion county grand jury. The grand jury later returned a not true bill in the case, and it was dismissed.

The plaintiff alleges that publicity attendant on the charge injured him in his person, prevented him from attending to his business, destroyed his reputation and credit, and caused him to suffer the stigma of a criminal.

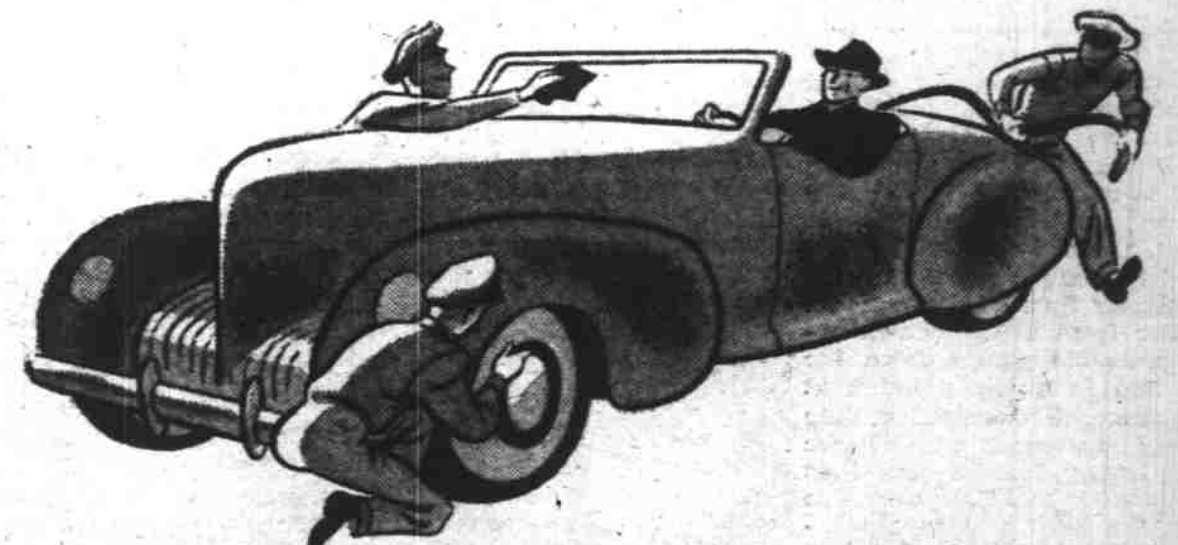
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
