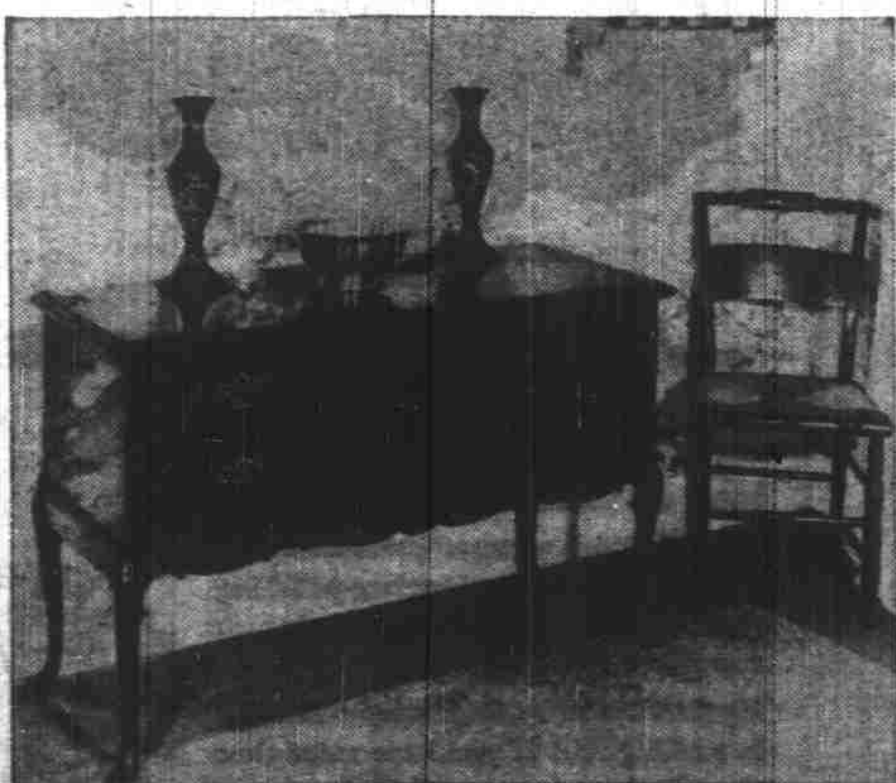

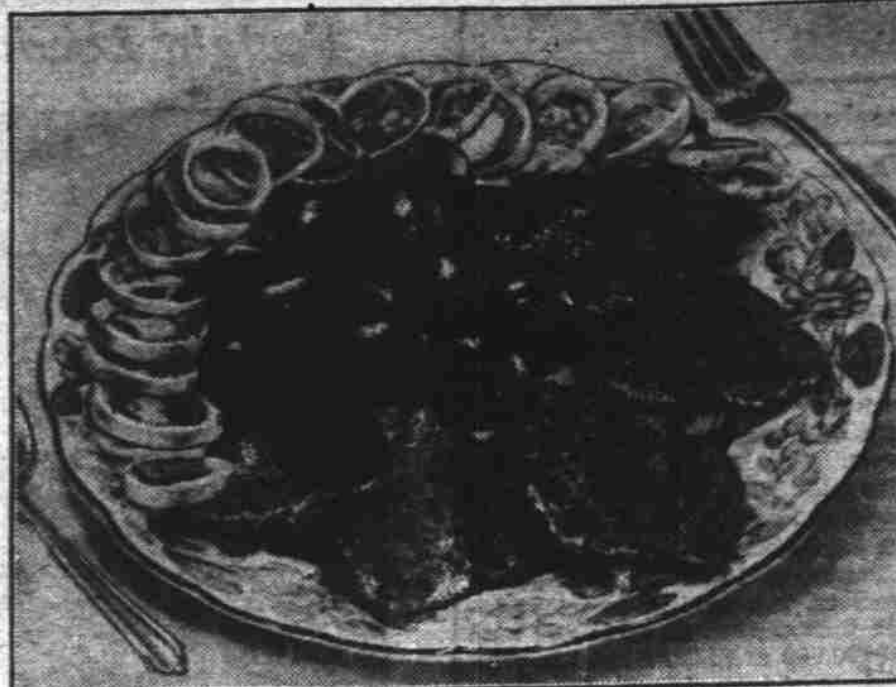
Good old black-eyed peas will taste mighty good for dinner tonight, even if the calendar does say it's spring, and legumes are a traditionally winter food.

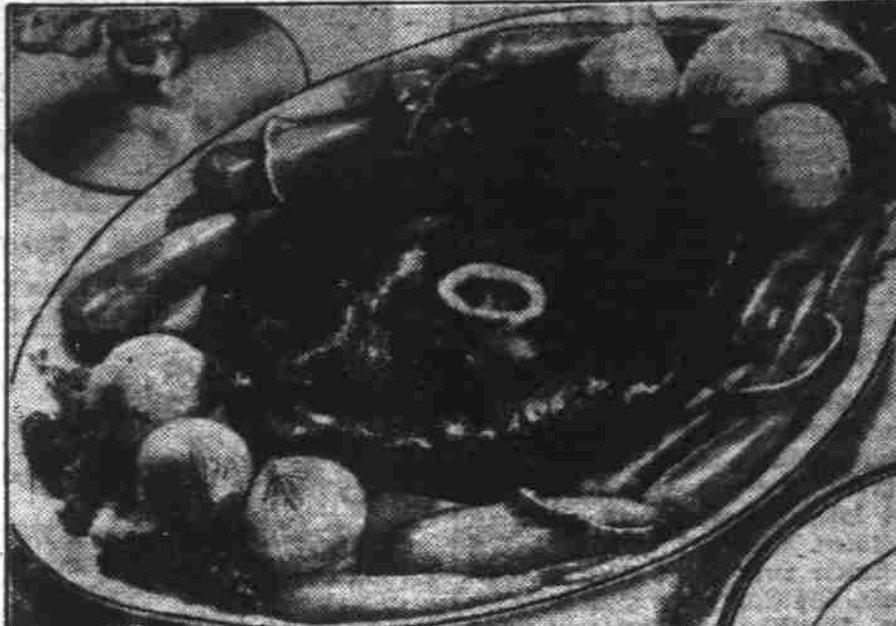

STEAK EATERS NOTE!—Cubed beef steak is one of the very modern pan broiling steaks. Round or shoulder steak is scored or "cubed" to cut the connective tissue and thus tender the meat. Cubed steaks should be pan broiled in a heavy skillet until well browned. A bit of discretion is needed to not overcook and dry out this meat. The onion rings were French fried to give a crusty brown coating to these rings of nature's gift.



FOR GOOD OLD-FASHIONED goodness, try a pot roast of beef, well flanked with succulent vegetables. Shown here is an arm or round bone roast from the forequarter. It was browned on all sides in a little lard in a heavy kettle, then simmered gently in just enough water to half cover the meat. True success demands a judicious use of water, a blending of seasonings, and long slow cooking. It's not a time for speed. Carrots, onions, and other vegetables may be cooked in the rich broth around the meat for 30 to 40 minutes before serving.
