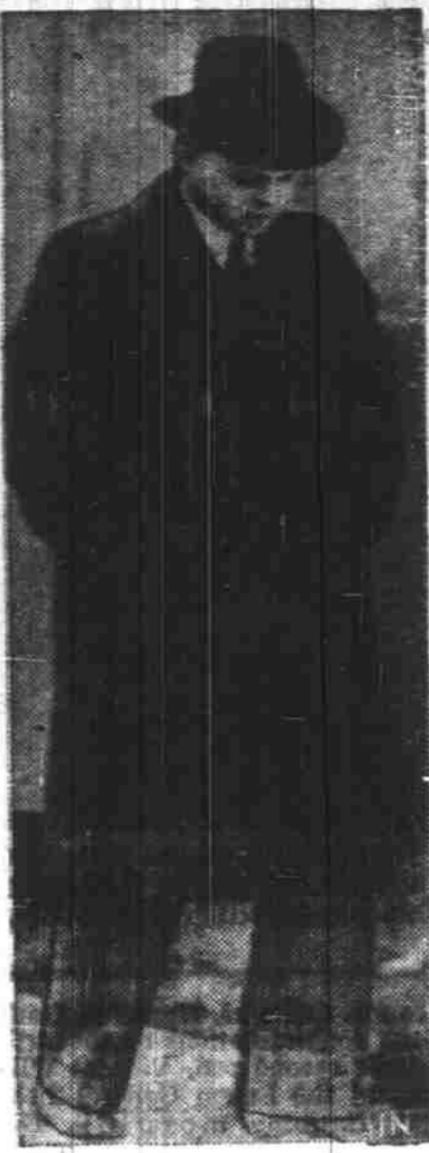

vice-president; Mrs. C. H. Harwood, second vice-president; Mrs. Mildred M. Nelson, secretary; and

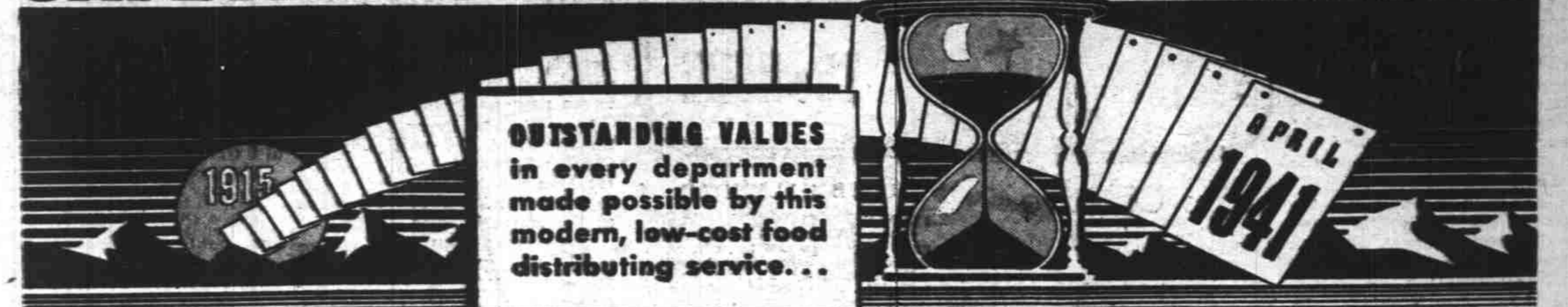
Mrs. Joe Rogers, treasurer. Mrs. Fratzke announced the Golden Jubilee convention of
