Grain Slumps After Rally

Profit-Taking, Other Sales Causes Drop From Season High

CHICAGO, April 3-(AP)-Wheat prices about-faced today after bounding upward as much as a cent a bushel to new highs since last May, and at one time slumped more than 2 cents from the early highs under pressure of profit taking and some hedging sales.

Wheat closed 38-1 cent lower than Wednesday, May 91%-1/2, July 901/2-58.

Grain men spent another session trying to translate reports of Washington developments into market action and then decided to accept profits available as a result of 15 to 20 cents appreciation in wheat values since mid-February and 8 to 10 cents gain in corn.

Early wheat buying was associated with Washington reports of prospects of higher loan rates for the new crop and marking quota adoption. May wheat rose to 931/8 while September matched that price. Two months ago September sold at a discount of about 6 cents under May.






