**BAKED CHICKEN IN CREAM**  
 4-pound chicken  
 1/4 cup milk  
 1/4 cup flour  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 Dash of pepper  
 1/2 cup butter or other fat  
 2 cups hot cream or evaporated milk

Cut chicken in serving portions, dip in milk then in a mixture of the flour, salt and pepper. Brown in fat and place in a baking dish. Pour cream over the top, cover dish and simmer very slowly for several hours until chicken is tender, and cream cooks to a thick sauce. Color and flavor is gained by a generous sprinkling of paprika. Will take from 1 to 2 hours.

**MAPLE PARFAIT**  
 4 eggs  
 1/2 cup hot maple syrup  
 2 cups whipping cream  
 Beat eggs slightly and pour

### String Saver Assists in Industry

String-savers all over the country will be interested to know that they are involved in a very important branch of the American cotton industry. For instance, to make the string they like to save, and that other people put to such good use, takes all the cotton grown on 400,000 southern acres, according to reports received by the Cotton-Textile institute.

This means that one hundred million pounds of cotton are converted into the finest types of light and heavy twines, clothes lines, fishnets and lines, sash cords, tire cord and other types where flexibility, quality or appearance are of importance.

Two-thirds of the cotton twine manufactured is used for tying purposes, one-fifth is used for sewing, and one-eighth for the making and mending of fishnets and lines. It is not known what percentage is used by string-savers.
