String Saver Industry

String-savers all over the country will be interested to know that they are involved in a very important branch of the American cotton industry. For instance, to make the string they like to save, and that other people put to such good use, takes all the cotton grown on 400,000 southern acres, according to reports received by the Cotton-Textile institute.

This means that one hundred million pounds of cotton are converted into the finest types of light and heavy twine, clotheslines, fishnets and lines, sash cords, tire cord and other types where flexibility, quality or appearance are of importance.

Two-thirds of the cotton twing manufactured is used for tying purposes, one-fifth is used for sewing, and one-eighth for the making and mending of fishnets 2 cups hot cream or evaporated and lines. It is not known what percentage is used by string-sav-
