

Stocks Drop After Rally

Early Activity Brings Few 1941 Highs but Gains Are Lost

NEW YORK, April 4.—(AP)—The strong rallying trend of Thursday wilted in today's stock market, just as on similar occasions in the past several months.

There was a short lived show of activity on the upside at the start. Early gains of fractions to a point or so for rails and steels were reduced or cancelled at the close. In the forenoon a number of new 1941 highs were posted.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was unchanged at 42.3. It was a relatively broad market, 789 individual issues being traded. Of these 307 were up, 246 down and 236 unchanged.

Dwindling of volume on the stemming of the recovery tide provided a little encouragement for bullish forces. Transfers totaled 704,920 shares against 940,560 the day before which was the largest turnover of the year to date.

Stocks getting into new high ground for the year and retaining modest advances at the finish included US Rubber, Consolidated Oil, Southern Pacific and the Preferreds of Santa Fe and Pere Marquette.

Wheat Soars, Then Skids

Buying Stimulated by Security Strength, Federal Program

CHICAGO, April 4.—(AP)—Wheat prices soared almost two cents in the first few minutes of trading today and then spent the remainder of the session swinging over a wide range, dipping at times as much as 1/2 cent below previous closing levels.

May wheat reached 93¢, highest in 10 months, and new crop contracts came within fractions of the season's peaks. Buying was stimulated by various phases of the government program, including stimulation of livestock production which would affect grains indirectly, and likelihood of adoption of marketing quotas along with higher loan rates for the new crop.

Strength of securities and sharp gains in the hog and lard markets, with government purchases of lard and pork products substantial, were additional bullish factors.

Profit taking and hedges against increased offerings of loan and free wheat and receipt of good moisture over much of the winter wheat belt accounted for the selling. Wheat closed only 3/8¢ higher than yesterday, May 92 1/4¢, July 91-91 1/2¢.
