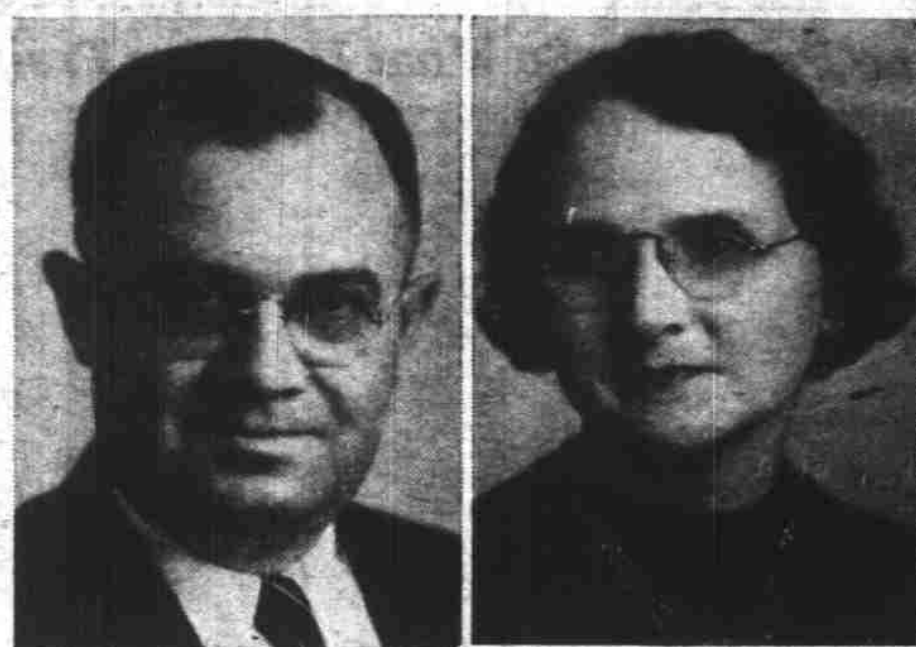
Garden Club to Hear Prof. Legg

Ballot Title Ready On Fish Referendum

Ballot title for a referendum measure attacking senate bill No. 53 of the 1941 legislature, prohibiting net fishing in coastal streams and bays, with certain exceptions, was completed by Attorney General I. H. VanWinkle here Saturday.

In case a sufficient number of signatures are obtained the referendum measure will go on the ballot at the 1942 general election.

The report fixed the cost of the complete transmission and distribution system, plus general equipment and working capital, at \$1,309,102.

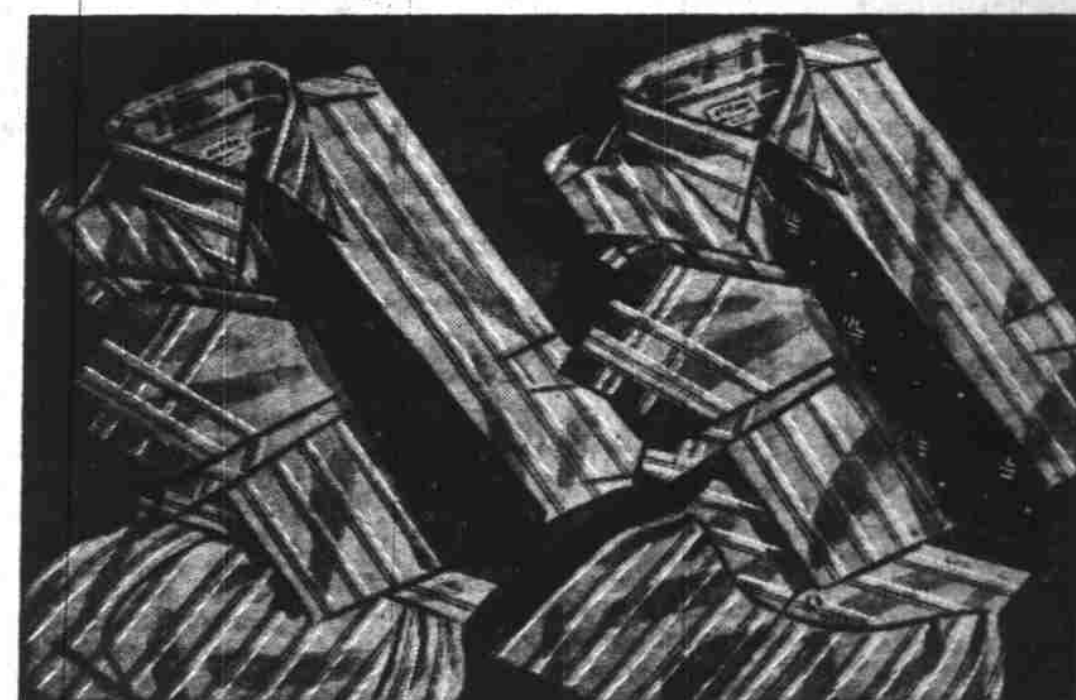
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
