Woodburn Farmers Consider Pickle Deal With Cannery

WOODBURN—About 60 local farmers attended a meeting arranged by the Woodburn chamber of commerce here Tuesday to consider growing pickle cucumbers under a proposed deal with Libby, McNeil and Libby.

Nearly 50 acres were signed up and company representatives said this encouraged them to believe the deal will probably be put through. The company wants a total of 100 acres in this area. If the deal materializes, the company will set up a receiving station in Woodburn and will ship the cucumbers to its Portland plant every 24 hours for processing into pickles.
