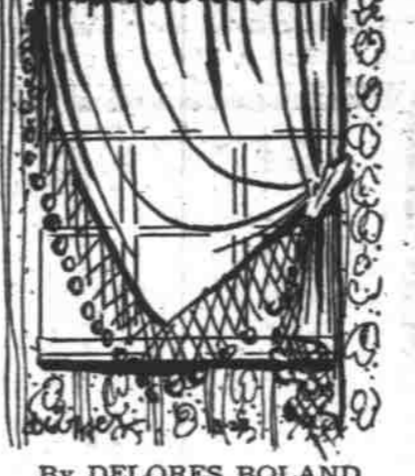
### Farewell Party On Wednesday
