Justice Felton Dismisses Jury Unable to Reach Verdict in Alleged Drunken Driving

A justice court jury was dismissed late Thursday afternoon when it informed Justice of the Peace Joseph E. Felton that it could not reach a verdict in the case of Frank W. Roseborough, tried on a charge of driving while intoxicated.

The jury, which was out for 20 minutes, returned to the court with the statement that it had been unable to reach an agreement on the verdict, and was released by Judge Felton.

Roseborough was arrested several weeks ago.
