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Orchestra Is Preparing Concert

Enchanting symphonic music from 19th century masters and colorful tone poems by modern composers will be presented Thursday night at the senior high school auditorium by the Salem Philharmonic orchestra at the final concert of the season.

Members of the music committee, headed by Miss Frances Virginia Melton, working with the conductor, Edouard Hurimann, have arranged a program with much popular appeal and unusual contrasts.

Charmingly melodic, the Liszt E-Flat Concerto, which will be the offering of the guest artist, Frederic Rothchild, concert pianist from Portland. This is one of the great piano concertos of the ages and the fine talent of the young concert artist promises a real treat.

Contrast in the Russian music of the early 19th century and the outstanding modern soviet will be found in the works of two Russian artists of those periods.

The overture from the opera "Russian and Ludmilla" composed by Michael Ivanovitch Glinka, in the early 19th century, is typical of the Russian work of that period and will be contrasted with the "Sailor's Dance" by Glinka, from the ballet suite "The Red Poppy" which is regarded as a first example of soviet melodrama with a revolutionary subject.

The Haydn "Symphonic Miltaire" is another of the numbers which has been prepared by the orchestra. This is a martial symphony, picturing exquisitely the troubled times in which the composer worked. The first movement will be presented by the orchestra.

Extremely modern, true tone pictures in modern style, are the two selections from a suite composed by Menotti Salta, a contemporary composer, whose symphonic works are distinguished by their lightness and pictorial style. "March of the Midgits" and "Fluttering Fireflies" are descriptive in title of these works which are unusual in their symphonic arrangement, calling for full orchestral participation.

The program arranged for Thursday is one which those less familiar with classical music can fully enjoy.

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Family Bookshelf

Those readers who like to know what is new among the late good novels will find a carefully selected list here. While all may not be available on your first call at the library, they are all worth waiting for.

Vardis Fisher, well known Idaho author of best sellers including "Children of God" has just finished a new book "City of Illusion." It is the story of a forceful and dynamic woman who dominates a large part of the robust life of early Virginia City during its heyday as a silver mining district. This is a realistic story of boom town days which will interest both men and women readers.

"Not By Strange Gods" by Elizabeth Madox Roberts is a group of six short stories by one of America's best women authors. Setting for each story is in the Kentucky so often portrayed before by this author; her prose is so carefully and beautifully composed that it is really poetic.

Another distinguished literary light among American women writers is Ellen Glasgow; her newest novel is "In This Our City" and its setting is in a Virginia tidewater city of some thirty years ago. Plot is not really important in Miss Glasgow's novels, although this is interesting; one reads for the author's clear-cut characterizations and distinguished prose.
