Row on Row Of Germans Meet Death

Wednesday night havoc done in London by the Germans, but Prime Minister Churchill chose the occasion to warn the axis that any bombing of Athens or Cairo would bring quick and systematic British attacks on Rome.

A statement issued from No. 10 Downing street, the prime minister's official residence, also told the world that Vatican City, seat of the pope, would be spared, but said the Italians were preparing a "characteristic trick"—the bombing of the holy city with captured British bombs—if the British bombed Rome.

On the north African front, the German-Italian drive eastward from Libya apparently was stalled, although fierce, inconclusive hand-to-hand combat continued around Tobruk and Salum.

German announcement of capitulation of the remainder of the Yugoslav armies was in effect confirmed by the British board of trade and ministry of economic warfare, which proclaimed all Yugoslavia "enemy-occupied territory."

Yugo Collapse Frees More Nazis for Attack
Yugoslav collapse apparently freed more Germans for the assault on Greece, where observers from the front compared the ferocious conflict with Leonidas' stand farther south at Thermopylae in 480 B.C. Leonidas and his little band of Spartans were annihilated by the Persian hordes of Xerxes, but their epic defense fired the imagination of all Greece, and Thermopylae endures to this day as a synonym for heroic and unstinting devotion to a cause against all odds.

Only a similar modern spirit can save Greece, observers agreed. As an example of that spirit and of the German scope of attack, a British Hussar officer, survivor of a proud old regiment which resisted to the last in a mountain pass, declared:

"After a tank attack, the German sent their infantry up the hill four deep. We mowed them down the first three rows, but we ran out of bullets when the fourth came."

Location of the British-Greek withdrawal was not disclosed, but it apparently was in the west and west-center to prevent a rear attack on the firm-holding east and center.

The east flank was declared to be unbroken despite massed onslaughts of the nazis in the stretch between Mount Olympus and the Pindus.

In the center around Kalabaka, the resistance was just as stern. The gray German dead were heaped high.

Most serious German incursions were placed in the Albanian frontier sector and around Grevena. Withdrawal from Albania was a blow to the proud Greeks who there hurled back the Italian armies in six months of bitter warfare before the Germans came.

The Italian news agency, Stefani, reported that Italian troops were now within sight of Porto Edda, the Albanian port named for Mussolini's daughter. The Greeks took it December 6.

The Germans were using vast numbers of dive bombers against the Greeks, apparently to make up for the lesser value of mechanized ground equipment in the craggy fastnesses of the battlefield.

The outnumbered RAF concentrated on German troops and communications behind the lines, but reported it had downed 12 German planes in three days.

Credit Control Speech Topic

Irvine L. Miller, manager of the Personal Finance company, spoke on the proper opening of new accounts and the importance of credit control when he spoke Friday at the luncheon meeting of the Salem Credit association.

"Business prosperity is growing," Miller said, "and its effect will soon or is being felt in Salem. It will give an opportunity for local men to do more business but the expansion should not be made at the expense of credit control. Don't sacrifice a sound business for one that may topple if the wind blows too hard," he warned.

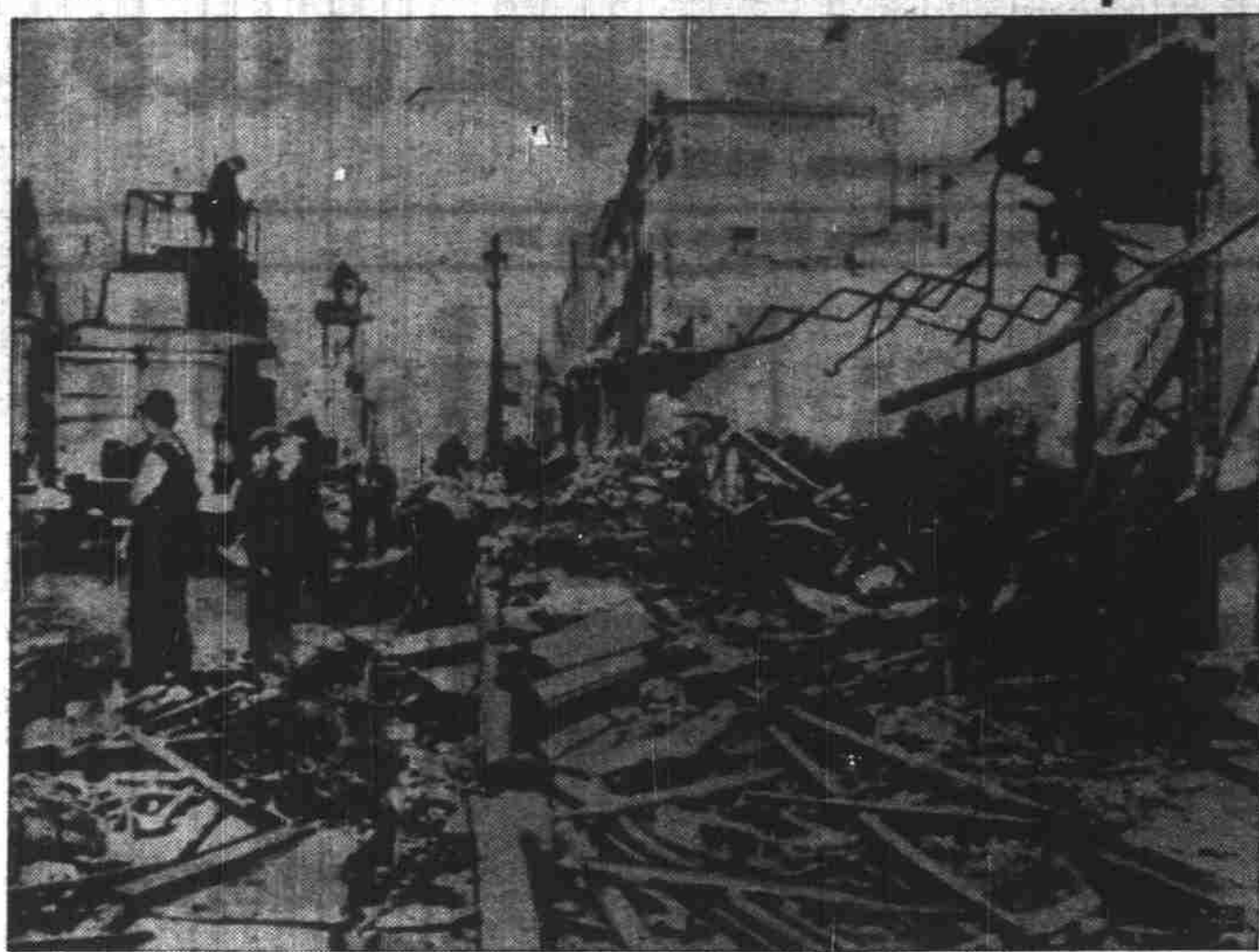

Figures Given On Irrigation Districts

There were 62 irrigation districts in Oregon on June 30, 1940, of which 52 were active, the biennial report of the state hydroelectric commission released here Friday disclosed.

Unmatured bonds outstanding aggregated \$1,399,100 and matured bonds in default \$879,500. Bond interest in default totaled \$728,211. Reconstruction finance corporation loans secured by old securities aggregated \$1,419,833 with the par value of old securities not deposited under the RFC loan fixed at \$98,107.

United States reclamation charges outstanding total \$10,991,832 and certificates of indebtedness outstanding, \$461,700. The total outstanding indebtedness was \$16,491,255.

The latter item does not include United States reclamation projects under construction, the cost of which had not been determined.

Istanbul, Turkey, in commenting on the death of Greek Premier Alexandros Koris said it was "not due to natural causes."

"While some persons held death was due to heartbreak over reversals in Greece, many others advance the hypothesis death was not due to natural causes," the agency said.

Failure of the Athens radio to announce the cause of the premier's death, the agency said, renders "more founded the hypothesis Koris was conscious of his most grave fault was dragging his country to ruin and voluntarily avoided with death the consequences of his political folly."

Both Circuit Courts Busy

Testimony of the defendants was completed Friday in the case of Martha F. Newell vs. Lloyd H. Corey, on trial before Circuit Judge L. H. McMahan.

The case was expected to reach the jury next Monday with the resumption of the hearing at 10 a.m. Damages of \$5000 are sought for injuries allegedly resulting from an accident February 12, 1940, in Silverton.

In Circuit Judge L. G. Lewelling's court, hearing was completed in the equity case of Mary Reynolds vs. C. A. Ratcliff, and the matter was taken on advisement without briefs.

The suit is for reconveyance of real property allegedly conveyed on August 30, 1930, by plaintiff to defendant in trust for the former's use and benefit. The defendant admits that the lands were the plaintiff's property, but makes denial of all other allegations. An accounting is also asked.

In the criminal court, Judge McMahan continued the sentence of Harry Staples, who pleaded guilty to a charge of drunken driving on which he had previously been sentenced to serve 30 days in jail and pay \$100 fine in municipal court.

Draftees Get Longer Time To Prepare

Oregon's 57 local selective service boards Friday were advised by Lieutenant-Colonel Elmer V. Wootton, state selective service director, that selective service regulations have been amended to provide a greater length of time for selectees to present themselves after receiving an order to report for induction.

The amendment, effective Saturday, provides that the time specified for the registrant to report for induction shall be at least ten days after the date the order to report is mailed by the board, Colonel Wootton said.

Present regulations require that the board allow only five days for the registrant to report after the order is mailed.

In special cases the boards may extend the time for reporting beyond the ten-day period, but not to exceed 60 days, unless there is good cause for further postponement.
