Athens sources have reported British and Greek forces were engaged in a fierce battle with German mechanized units in the Kalabaka region (vertical shading) and Italians reported the whole Greek front was collapsing. Arrows indicate German thrusts in the Metsovo and Grevena regions, and d represent the general region in which Rome reports said Italians had crossed into Greece. Later reports indicate Greek troops fell back to consolidated defense with British units.
